
We have many exciting programs and activities happening on both campuses that are supported or driven by our alumni association.



# Encaenia inaugurates the CURRIE CENTER



Official opening Oct. 7

The official opening of The Richard J. CURRIE CENTER will be held on Friday, Oct. 7, at 1 p.m. The event will be open to the public, and all are welcome.

Tt was fitting that the first UNB event in the new Richard J. CURRIE CENTER on the Fredericton campus honoured those for whom Chancellor Richard Currie built the facility — the students of UNB.

In the intimate surroundings of the building's main gym, just more than 1,300 Fredericton graduates of 2011 received their degrees in four ceremonies during the 182nd Encaenia on May 18 and 19.

While the building's official public opening is to be held on Friday, Oct. 7, at 1 p.m., the 2011 Encaenia was the first major event held there.

During the ceremonies, **Graham Farquharson**, a leader in mining engineering in Canada, received an honorary doctor of science; Measha Brueggergosman, an internationally acclaimed soprano from Fredericton, received an honorary doctor of letters; and Lawson Hunter, a lawyer of international repute in the areas of competitive and regulatory law, received an honorary doctor of laws (see facing page).

As well, a new UNB tradition was launched on both campuses with the distribution of a newlyminted UNB Coin (see page 8).

The audience at UNB's 182nd Encaenia was L expecting Graham Farquharson to accept an honorary degree and give a speech during the graduation ceremony.

What they didn't expect was the \$2-million donation Farquharson made to the university.

Farguharson received an honorary doctor of science degree at one of four spring graduation ceremonies at UNB Fredericton when he announced the donation, surprising everyone in attendance.

"Now I have a university diploma from UNB and have also entered that stage of life where satisfaction comes from distributing that which we have managed to accumulate," Farquharson said in his address.

### Attachment to UNB

Farquharson attended UNB from 1959 until 1962, and was on the hockey team during his final

year. He went on to attend other Honorary degree recipient delivers ... universities, but was most fond of his time at UNB.

"Having attended three universities in Canada, I

have always made it clear that my greatest attachment is to UNB, where I spent the first three years of my university career, going as far as one could in the mining engineering program at that time," he said.

Farquharson went on to attend the University of Alberta and then Queen's, and co-founded Strathcona Mineral Service in 1974. He is now president of the company.

Last year, he was inducted into the Canadian Mining Hall of Fame.

The company was one of the whistleblowers of the Bre-X mining scandal in the 1990s.

"[It was] the biggest monetary decision in my career, but not a difficult one, as long as one follows the principle to tell it like it is," he said in his address. "In this case, that meant saying that there was probably not any gold on the Bre-X property."

Aside from his principle of telling the truth, Farguharson also learned the value of hard work. He started working at a lumberyard in Bathurst, N.B.,

His donation will be split evenly among the geology department, the faculty of science, the faculty of nursing, and the university itself to support its



# Resurrected!

### Famed mural by Fred Ross re-created, placed in court

Art history was made in June when UNB Fredericton unveiled a re-created mural by renowned Canadian artist Fred Ross (LLD'86).

The original two-panel mural, Destruction of War and Rebuilding the World Through Education, was completed in 1948 as a memorial to the Fredericton High School graduates who died in the Second World War. The monumental 16-by-20-foot painting was tragically lost or destroyed after being removed from the school auditorium in the 1950s.

"Seldom, if ever, does one get a second chance like this," said Dr. Ross, who holds an honorary doctor of laws degree from UNB. "I'm not aware of any other work in Canada, or anywhere else in the world, that has been resurrected in this way."

The re-created mural now hangs in the performance court of The Richard J. CURRIE CENTER.

"Universities should support public art," said UNB Chancellor Richard Currie. "Fred Ross's mural is an outstanding example of public art and will be accessible to everyone who attends or participates in an event at the Currie Center."

### Mural represents 'a cautionary tale'

"It is truly fitting that a significant work of art by a celebrated Canadian artist should have a place of prominence in this landmark building," said UNB President Eddy Campbell. "The spectacular architecture and imposing painting complement each other beautifully. It is also a tribute to our history. The original Academy of Arts and Science created in 1785 included the institutions we now know as Fredericton High School and the University of New Brunswick. This building that is so important to our future will also honour our past."

The mural depicts a cautionary tale, contrasting two sides of human endeavour: the wasteful devastation of war and the promise of peace and progress through education. Over both panels hangs the threat of nuclear conflagration. Though it was originally painted more than 60 years ago, its message continues to be relevant today. The mural was re-created by three New Brunswick artists - Amy Ash, Sara Griffin and Fred Willar – working under the direction of Dr. Ross. Although only black-andwhite photos of the original remain, the artists had access to Dr. Ross's full-scale drawings, which did survive and are held in the collection of the National Gallery of Canada.

The \$125,000 project, which took six months to complete, was supported by a \$50,000 grant from the Sheila Hugh Mackay Foundation and contributions from numerous other donors, including Dr. Currie and the J.T. Clark Family Foundation.

### About the artists

A native and lifetime resident of Saint John, Fred Ross painted the original mural between 1946 and 1948, completing it on his 21st birthday. The \$700 commission he earned enabled him to visit Mexico, where he viewed the works of Diego Rivera, Frieda Kahlo and other acclaimed muralists. During the course of his career, Dr. Ross has painted six murals, countless portraits and numerous other figurative works. His paintings have been included in more than 80 solo and group exhibitions and are held in collections across North America. Dr. Ross is a member of the Order of Canada, the Order of New Brunswick and the Royal College of Art.

Amv Ash holds a bachelor of fine arts from Mount Allison University and a bachelor of education from UNB. She is a member of the Third Space Gallery and is outreach co-ordinator of the Saint John Arts Centre. Her work is exhibited at the Ingrid Mueller Gallery in downtown Fredericton.

Sara Griffin, who served as studio manager for the mural project, is a graduate of the Nova Scotia School of Art and Design and holds a bachelor of education from UNB. Her wide-ranging experience includes mural painting, print making and teaching portfolio students at the Saint John Arts Centre.

Fred Willar, who was a student of Fred Ross at Saint John Vocational School in the 1950s, is an accomplished painter and muralist in his own right. Two of his murals can be seen in the library and the cafeteria at Harbourview High School in Saint John.

# **Donor doubles** bursaries after meeting recipients

ilian Jardine created and fund-Led two bursaries in 2008 to honour her late husband, Colin Jardine (BScME'66). Thrilled with the impact they've had, she's increased the number to four annual awards.

"I always intended to support four, but thought I should start slowly and make sure it's a good idea," says Ms. Jardine. "I've been so impressed with the quality of the students and with the dedication of the faculty and staff members that I'm confident I made the right decision."

She has twice flown from her home in Calgary, where Colin Jardine was president of Alcan Price (now APEL Extrusions Ltd.), to Fredericton to meet the bursary recipients. She has the same fondness for campus now as when she came from Shawinigan, Que., to see her husband during their student days.

"Colin loved UNB and I had lots of fun visiting him at carnival time and for the engineers' ball. He really believed in giving back and donated to UNB every year."

After his passing in 2008, former colleagues told her how much he'd encouraged them to pursue their goals with integrity and to become life-long learners. She thought a bursary would be a good way to continue his legacy of helping people and supporting UNB.

"He came from a modest background but had lots of drive. I figured there must be other students like him that could use a little boost to get off to a good start in life."

The Colin Jardine Memorial Bursaries are valued at \$2,500 and are open to students in mechanical engineering who possess qualities similar to its namesake: leadership, strong ethics and a compassion for others, in addition to financial need.

"We're very pleased and proud to have this award in honour of a successful and well-respected alumnus," says David Coleman, dean of engineering. "And we're so thankful to Lilian for helping students with ability and desire follow in Colin's footsteps."

Of the seven recipients so far, the feedback Ms. Jardine most often hears is that the bursary allowed them to pursue extracurricular activities and community service, facets of university life both Jardines valued.

Patrick Mulherin is one of those who's benefitted. A fourth-year student in mechanical engineering, he's already thinking about continuing the legacy. "Knowing first-hand how much a bursary means, I hope I can give back to UNB as an alumnus and help students as much as my benefactors have helped me."

# UNB board approves balanced \$172.2M budget for 2011-12

get for the 2011-12 fiscal year. The \$172.2-million budget represents an annual increase of \$4.7 million, or 2.8 per cent. It is the second budget in a multi-year series designed to ensure the university's long-term financial stability, following the dramatic effect of recent downward trends in global economies and financial markets.

"It has been a challenging time for universities across the country, including ours," said UNB President Eddy Campbell. "Over the past few years, everyone at the university has worked

ensure our university continues to offer the quality education and world-class research our province needs."

Over the past few years, UNB has cut more than \$18-million from its operating budget, Campbell noted.

The provincial government's investment in the further development of a provincial knowledge economy by increasing the operating grant to public universities by two per cent has helped UNB balance its budget and close the funding gap with other jurisdictions.

While the fiscal environment required

The balanced budget includes several cost adjustments to tuition and ancillary fees, increases to student financial support (scholarships and bursaries) and provisions for continuing improvements to classrooms, labs and student spaces. Tuition for students in undergraduate and graduate programs will increase by \$200, the cap established by the provincial government. Inflationbased adjustments will also be made to residence fees on both campuses.

# Revolutionizing health care

Focus on cervical health for young women

UNB Fredericton researcher Linda Duffett-Leger is helping revolutionize health care in Canada.

Her PhD work, Developing a Web-Based Approach for Promoting Cervical Health in Young Women, has implications for health care providers, government screening programs and, in particular, young women.

In 2009, Chatelaine magazine named Duffett-Leger as one of the top five women revolutionizing health care in Canada

Duffett-Leger's research calls for a more modern approach to promoting cervical health in young women, namely using the Internet to call attention to the important issue.

"I determined that a web-based approach is something that might be interesting and relevant to young women, given their familiarity with computers and their use of the Internet.

"There hadn't been a lot of research around young women and how they've used the Internet to gain information about their health, so that was part of my dissertation research."

Duffett-Leger received her PhD Interdisciplinary Studies from UNB this year.

### A site that caters to young women

In Canada, cervical cancer is the most preventable form of cancer in young women given early detection, through regular Pap test screening, and adequate follow-up.

Many young women are unaware of the factors that could put them at risk for developing cervical cancer. Although they may search the Internet for health related information, many sites do not reflect their needs or present information in a way that

"I'm trying to make them aware by using technology, whether it's social networking, computers, or cell phones and getting them the information where they're most comfortable, most familiar with," Duffett-Leger said.

Duffett-Leger conducted focus groups with young women to determine how they used the Internet to seek health information and to find out what would appeal to them as useful sites. Using this information, several participants developed a prototype of a website that would inform young women of their potential risks for developing cervical cancer and encourage them to engage in screening practices.

In her research, Duffett-Leger found that most websites are not interactive and do not use age appropriate strategies to engage young women. For example, some websites presented cartoons and colours, such as pink and purple, that appeal more to young girls.

"Young women in the 18 to 25 age group would be turned off by that," she said. "These websites

have not been developed with young women, so web developers tend to develop websites based on what they think young women want."

In her focus group, the young women said a text message reminder to go for a Pap test and a more interactive website would be more helpful.

### UNB a help in research

Duffett-Leger attended UNB for both for her undergraduate and graduate degrees. She said one of the best things about attending the university is the presence of the National Research Council (NRC) Institute for Information Technology, located within the UNB campus.

"It's the only place in Canada that offers expertise in people-centred technologies," she said. "And they have extra knowledge in human-computer interactions and have a state-of-the-art lab as well, so their collaboration was very important to my research.

"I've also had the opportunity to work with Canada Research Chairs, both on my masters and my doctoral research, so they've really influenced my research here."

Duffett-Leger's research was funded the Canadian Institute for Health Research, the N.B. Health Research Foundation, and the Canadian Cancer Society Research Institute.

In the future, Duffett-Leger hopes to receive a Canada Research Chair, as well as work in an acade-

Congress 2011 was a working meeting for Canada's academics, scholars and researchers – providing opportunities to share knowledge, solidify partnerships and create linkages between the university and other sectors. This year's series features former Gov.-Gen. Michaëlle Jean and her husband, Jean-Daniel Lafond, authors David Adams Richards and Antonine Maillet, National Chief Shawn Atleo, and one of Canada's leading climatologists, Andrew Weaver.

A large part of the event's success was due to an army of volunteers - UNB faculty, staff, alumni, and members of the Fredericton community. Hundreds stepped forward under the leadership of Michelle McNeil of UNB Fredericton's conference services, who acted as the Congress 2011 project manager.

The volunteers - ranging from orange T-shirt wearing "wayfinders" to green T-shirt wearing "technical support" people – were all over the campus, helping delegates at the drop of a hat.

UNB President Eddy Campbell paid tribute to the efforts of all involved.

The new building will be known as the Hans W. Klohn Commons.

"The Arthur & Jack Irving families have been great supporters of education in our province," said UNB President Eddy Campbell. "It is tremendously important to us to have these kinds of prominent reminders to our students that they can be successful while ensuring opportunities for themselves and

### Commons is 'more than a building'

The \$25-million Commons, with its innovative and modern design, will stand as a testament to the accomplishments of Hans W. Klohn and bring a new energy to UNB's Saint John campus. Part of the Tucker Park enhancement project, which includes the refurbishment of the Canada Games Stadium, the new Dalhousie Medicine New Brunswick facility, and the New Brunswick Community College's Allied Health building, the Commons will become the essential gathering place for a bustling campus.

As part of the implementation of UNB's new strategic plan, the Commons will offer students the latest in technology, writing and library services as well as high-quality learning and research facilities. It will be UNB's first green building, having been designed and constructed to a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) silver standard.

"The Commons is more than a building; it's a vision, an opportunity and aspiration," said Robert

MacKinnon, vice-president of UNB Saint John. "It is the cornerstone of a renewed University of New Brunswick in Saint John, offering our students the space and services they need to thrive in today's fastpaced and ever-changing world."

Described by those who know him as a modest man, Hans W. Klohn was born in Kiel, Germany. after earning a technical certificate in engineering, he worked for a steel company until 1952, when he emigrated to New Brunswick to take part in the Irving Pulp and Paper Mill expansion. Dr. Klohn was noticed by K.C. Irving and promoted to construction manager of the project, thus beginning a new chapter in his life.

In 1955, K.C. Irving and Hans W. Klohn started a new construction company called Ocean Steel & Construction, with Dr. Klohn serving as its first president. He was named an Honorary Life Member of the Saint John Construction Association, selected as a Titan of the Precast Concrete Industry, and, awarded an honorary doctor of science degree from UNB on May 20, 2011, in recognition of his efforts and influence in the construction industry and the community at large.

# From seafood to the Sea Dogs

Wayne Long recalled a piece of advice one of his UNB Saint John professors gave him: pursue your dreams.

"He told me there's nothing out there that you can't achieve," Long said. "It's been my motto ever since and it's helped me get to where I am today."

Long graduated from UNBSJ's business administration program in 1987, and spent more than 15 years working in the aquaculture industry, even leading his own company for seven years.

Now, he's the president of the Saint John Sea Dogs, who in May won the most coveted award in junior hockey: the MasterCard Memorial Cup.

"It's a terrific accomplishment for the organization," Long said. "And I think that this year's team will be looked back at and recognized as one of the greatest teams of all time in junior hockey."

The Sea Dogs became the first team from Atlantic Canada to win the MasterCard Memorial Cup. When the team returned to Saint John with the cup, they were greeted with a parade attended by thousands of people.

### Bearing the load of a city's, region's hopes

"It's tough to have a city's weight on their shoulders, and then a region's weight when we went to the Memorial Cup," Long said. "But we kept them focused, as fresh as possible, and kept them grounded. And we went out every game and prevailed."

Aside from celebrating a winning season, which also included winning the President's Cup, Long is celebrating some personal accomplishments of his own. He was awarded the John Horman Trophy for administrator of the year.

"It's a great honour for me and the whole organization," Long said. "It's reinforcement that we're a hockey team but there is a business side to the hockey. There are times when people forget the business side.'

The trophy is awarded annually to the top executive in the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League (QMJHL).

"For the whole administration staff, it's recognition that we're doing things right," Long said.

Long, who is a four-time recipient of the North American Award of Excellence in Sales and Marketing, said his degree in business administration from UNB Saint John prepared him well for his career.

"The program rounded me out for dealing with all sorts of situations," he said. "As president, I'm tasked with running the whole business – getting sponsors, dealing with corporations,

"I have a well-rounded background from the university that has helped me with my career," Long said. "I'm certainly a proud UNBSJer."



When Larry Hachey enrolled in university, he didn't have time or money to waste. Knowing this, he dug out the phone book and contacted an architect, lawyer, speech pathologist and accountant. Larry heard first-hand about their careers and what degree programs got them there. He was then able to narrow down his field of study and choose a program that suited him.

This experience sowed the seeds for what would eventually become the Bridge Network.

"Not every student has the confidence to do what I did that first year," the former Associated Alumni president said. "The Bridge Network offers a framework to do the same thing, and more, without students having to make those intimidating cold calls."

But the real catalyst behind the Bridge Network was a UNB alumni survey. It revealed that alumni want to give back by volunteering their time and connecting directly with students.

# **EFL** changes coming

### UNB e-mail accounts being moved to a 'cloud-based' service

s part of an overall transition of UNB's e-mail services, Achanges will be made in the coming months to the alumni E-mail Forwarding for Life (EFL) service.

Integrated Technology Services (ITS), after months of study, will be moving its e-mail to a "cloud-based" service -Microsoft's Live@edu - that will be delivered through the Internet and be accessible anywhere there's an Internet connection. The EFL service also will be moving to Live@edu.

For most of the thousands of you out there who hold EFL accounts, the changes will be mostly transparent.

The one major change is that once the transition takes place, your EFL account (for example: john.smith@unb.ca) will no longer forward messages to your "real" e-mail address, one that you set at your own choosing (for example: john.smith@hotmail.com). Instead, messages sent to your EFL address will go to a mailbox associated directly with the name of your account (john.smith@unb.ca). That mailbox will be hosted at Live@edu, accessible through the Internet.

We will keep our alumni EFL account holders informed of the changes through mass e-mailings and on our alumni homepage as the transition progresses.

The first phase of the overall ITS transition is slated for this fall. It is not expected the EFL system will be transitioned until some time in the new year.

# The health of the St. John

### Rivers institute finishes 10-year study

The Canadian Rivers Institute (CRI) at UNB has released L the St. John River State of the Environment Report, a document created after a decade of research on New Brunswick's largest river system.

Researchers found that the overall quality of water in the river has improved in the last 40 years, but there are a few areas that are still causing concern.

"The improvements have occurred because communities and industries are doing a better job of treating wastewater before discharging it to the river," said Allen Curry, director of the CRI. "There are also more stringent regulations and laws, and there is better monitoring by the regulatory agencies in Canada and the U.S."

Despite these changes, there are still several stretches of the river near urban centres, industries, and agricultural lands that researchers would like to see improve.

"We have made progress but there is more we can do to reduce our impact on the river's water quality and condition," said Dr. Curry.

### Dams change the nature of the river

The Beechwood and Mactaquac dams have also had a major impact by changing the physical nature of the river.

"Flow downstream of the dams is highly controlled because water is released almost exclusively to meet current or potential energy production demands, said Dr. Curry. "The dams are barriers to fish movement along the river and fish moving downstream have poor survival through the dam's turbines or when they fall over the dam itself."

The report used the existing and accessible data that goes back to the 1950s to assess the state of the Saint John River and changes over time.

Researchers believe the Saint John River will continue to face a number of challenges, but also say it's important to realize we have the knowledge and technology to better manage our wastewaters, river flows, and fish passage.

Over the past decade CRI has established itself as an international leader in the field of river science, building partnerships with over a dozen countries. Working with government and business has helped the CRI spread its knowledge and benefits to their communities.

Established in 2001, the CRI is the first institute of its kind in the world. With a collaboration of researchers at UNB on both the Fredericton and Saint John campuses, the mandate of the CRI is to develop the aquatic science needed to understand, protect, and sustain water resources for the region, nation, and the planet.

Wallace McCain (DLitt'02), one of Canada's most notable entrepreneurs and generous philanthropists, passed away on May 13, 2011, after a 14-month battle with pancreatic cancer.

Dr. McCain, co-founder and vice-chairman, McCain Foods, and chairman, Maple Leaf Foods, succumbed to his illness just months after he and his wife of 56 years, Margaret (LLD'93), donated \$5 million to UNB to further support the entrepreneurial activities of the Wallace McCain Institute for Business Leadership. The couple had provided the \$2-million investment that led to the creation of the centre in 2006.

UNB President Eddy Campbell paid tribute to Dr. McCain in recognition of his and his family's support of the institution.

"Wallace was a true friend of the University of New Brunswick," Dr. Campbell said. "He was generous with his time and leadership expertise, as well as his financial resources. His investments have helped our university provide more educational opportunities to more

"When I think of the definition of entrepreneurs we are using in our strategic plan — those who create opportunities for



# Building success by putting people first

# From intramurals to Entrepreneur of the Year

George Donovan explains how a PhysEd degree prepared him to be president/CEO of Gogii Games

When George Donovan (BPE'95) began his degree at UNB, he wanted to be a PhysEd teacher. Now, he's the president of Gogii Games, a Moncton-based company that's recently doubled its staff, has development offices in Nova Scotia, the Czech Republic, France and Romania, and is creating games for Gene Simmons of Kiss and his partner, Shannon Tweed.

Donovan credits recently retired UNB Dean of Kinesiology Terry Haggerty and instructor Jeff Burkard with sparking his interest in software and fostering his confidence.

"Dean Haggerty was a huge influence on my career. He introduced computers and the internet to PhysEd classes and to the administration of intramural sports. Jeff Burkard was also a big supporter of technology and me personally."

The incorporation of technology resonated with Donovan, who realized the potential of these emerging tools.

"I remember a Friday night, my friends were going to the Social Club and I was at the library on a computer, completely absorbed. I had this 'Aha!' moment about how much information was accessible using the internet."

### Getting an understanding of human behaviour

He started taking psychology courses to get a better understanding of human behaviour, which led to understanding buying and selling habits. His ability to predict a game's success has led to nine No. 1 titles and to Gogii Games receiving the 2011 KIRA award for a New Brunswick company that has succeeded in exporting a technology-based product or service outside the province.

Among other accolades, Donovan was named Emerging Entrepreneur of the Year for 2009 by Ernst & Young.

Dr. Haggerty taught many students over his 20 years at UNB, but says, "Some students really stand out and George is one of them. He had this intensity and enthusiasm that set him apart. It's no wonder he's done so well."

Because of the influence of his professors, Donovan wanted to give back to UNB. He created the Gogii Games Scholarship to help students in software engineering and has come to UNB to speak to share his knowledge with students.



# An incubator of hockey talent

### UNB development programs help foster professional careers for dozens



The V-Reds run

TNB has not only produced three national champion hockey teams in the past five years, it's also helped foster dozens of professional hockey careers. Not only has UNB become the top development program in Canada with four recent UNB players inking NHL contracts, but their youth developmental program has also been garnering considerable attention.

Thirty-six players drafted to the NHL are linked by their participation in hockey development camps held at UNB or by playing for the well known V-

Reds Prospects elite development program.

Since 2002, the UNB V-Red Prospects program has held development camps for players of all ages, ranging from their Junior Advanced Camp to this summer's Crimson Camp

featuring major junior and pro players. The intensive week-long camps focus on a player's growth — both as a hockey player and as a person.

"We have the philosophy that they're going to be people longer than they're going to be hockey players," said Gardiner MacDougall, head coach of the UNB Varsity Reds and a Prospects director. "We try to ingrain values that are going to help them in both aspects."

### **Growing dreams**

In the past nine years, 255 prospects have been drafted in the Canadian Hockey League (CHL), 36 in the NHL (with four being selected in the first round of both 2010 and in 2011), and five prospects have played for Team Canada in the World Junior U-20 tournament.

"We think it's pretty exciting. It's humbling in a lot of ways," MacDougall said of having such talent take part in the Prospects program. "The kids see an opportunity and they take full advantage of it. It's all about growing your dreams."

The Prospects program runs different camps for different ages. A number of Skills and Drills and AAA development camps are held throughout the season, but the majority of the camps take place during the summer.

On a typical day at the recent UNB Senior Advanced Camp – known as eastern Canada's top development opportunity — the prospective players will go on the ice three times.

They also participate in similar testing to the NHL combine fitness tests, so players can gauge their fit-

ness level. Most lunch hours feature a guest speaker (usually a player who has been drafted or a member of the Varsity Reds). Other feature presentations include prominent members of the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League (QMJHL) or pro hockey.

After lunch, the players engage in either a threeon-three or four-on-four tournament.

The week is highlighted by a mock style NHL draft, where each player gets selected to a team and gets a picture taken by team photographer Brian Smith.

"It's certainly one of our highlights and it really sets up an action-packed week," MacDougall said. "They go from bright and early to late at night, but that's part of the theme. It's a microcosm of life in major junior hockey. We have had eight recent camp participants get drafted at our UNB camp just two years ago and then get selected to the NHL.

Participating in the invitational camp is a big opportunity for players. Scouts from the NHL and the QMJHL attend.

### '92 Prospects

The hard work has paid off for the hockey players. The '92 V-Red Prospects (players who were born in 1992) have been the most successful group the program has seen.

This year, four players from that group were drafted in the first round of the NHL entry draft -Gabriel Landeskog to Colorado, Sean Couturier to Philadelphia, Nathan Beaulieu to Montreal and local stand-out Zack Phillips to Minnesota. Overall, an amazing 17 players from this spring team coached by UNB alumnus Roger Shannon were drafted to the NHL. Shannon was the co-chairman for the recent CIS National Championships, is the GM for the Varsity Reds Hockey program, and has been a prominent GM in the QMJHL.

"That group was probably the top spring team in Eastern North America and had travelled internationally to Europe," MacDougall said of the '92 Prospects.

While many of the players from the Prospects program forge futures in the hockey world, some of the players take their time spent at UNB as a different kind of learning experience.

"A lot of the players in our camps and our Prospects program have come here and decided to come to UNB to go to school rather than pursue hockey," MacDougall said. "We've had a number of players who decided to get a UNB university education out of this, which is neat as well. Our motto here at UNB is 'making a significant difference' and we are certainly fortunate that this can happen here at UNB in a number of different ways."

MacDougall will soon have his hands full again when the V-Reds start their. Last March, the team captured the CIS championship on home ice, and is looking to defend this season, again on home ice.



# New NBCC building opens on Fredericton campus

UNB now is co-existing with yet another educational institution on its Fredericton campus.

The New Brunswick Community College (NBCC), Fredericton campus, was officially opened in late June, and will take it in its first students this fall. The new building is situated at the top of the hill between the Wu Centre and Marshall d'Avray Hall.

The \$15-million building covers 4,680 square metres (52,000 square feet) and has a capacity of 400 seats.

Approximately 300 students are expected to be taking classes in the building this fall. The provincial government contributed \$11 million, while Industry Canada invested \$4 million under the Knowledge Infrastructure Program.

The campus will deliver programs in health, business administration, information technology, engineering technology and social services.

"Investments such as this will ensure New Brunswick Community College students and graduates continue to show up work-ready and equipped with the skills that they and their employers need today and into the future," said Marilyn Luscombe, NBCC president and chief executive officer.

"We are excited about this new facility and look forward to welcoming students in this state-of-the art building this fall.

"Being near the University of New Brunswick and St. Thomas University will further encourage continuous learning and the achievement of career success for our graduates as well as strengthen relationships with our post-secondary education partners," said Luscombe.

Her sentiments were echoed by students at UNB, and the administration at STU.

"We are welcoming of our colleagues from the college community," Jordan Thompson, president of the UNB Student Union, said in an interview

with *The Daily Gleaner*, adding it's definitely a positive change for his campus. "UNB students are used to sharing; we already do that with STU."

Outgoing STU President Dennis Cochrane told *The Gleaner* he thinks "it's a really positive thing that we're going to have this many more students on campus. There will be more activity between and among the universities because of the close proximity."

He said it won't be long before all three institutions can interface selected courses among campuses.

"I think what we have to do is not think we're competitors, but allies, and our goal is to get an educated population in New Brunswick."

NBCC Fredericton Principal Heather Hathaway told *The Gleaner* "there will be more student engagement with a broader student body. For sure, there will be that community of students."
