

# Meeting people, a pleasure of the job

In the fall edition of *UNB Alumni News*, I mentioned that I had spent time in the spring preparing for my retirement from the education system, and my transition to the role as President of the UNB Associated Alumni. Now that I am six months into office, I am pleased to report that the level of alumni activity means I am hardly "retired," and my initial experience has been extremely gratifying.

# This year rife with historical milestones on both campuses

UNB will be marking several significant historical milestones as the year 2004 begins.

On New Year's day, the university celebrated the 175th anniversary of the opening of the venerable Old Arts Building (now officially known as Sir Howard Douglas Hall) on the Fredericton campus with a re-enactment of the original dedication. It's been a long ride for the majestic structure that has dominated 'The Hill' for so long, but she doesn't seem to be tiring. It remains, after all, the oldest university building in Canada that is still in continuous use. Inside this edition, we take a brief look back at the building's origins.

Another benchmark arrives in February as the Faculty of Engineering marks 150 years of teaching engineers how to go about their business. The first formal instruction in civil engineering took place at UNB (then known as King's College) on Feb. 15, 1854, and again UNB was an innova-

tor — it was the first time engineering was included in the curriculum at a Canadian university. Over the past 150 years, UNB has educated more than 9,000 engineers, who have then taken their knowledge and skills to all corners of the globe. See page 19 to see how it all began, and what the faculty has planned to mark the occasion.

Finally, Celebration 2004 set for Saint John in September (see page 20) will mark three anniversaries for that campus — 40 years since UNBSJ was founded, 35 years since the Tucker Park Campus opened, and 30 years since the first students completed their entire degrees in Saint John.

Of course, when you're 218 years old, there's bound to be a sense of history about the place.

#### **Lighthouses of Atlantic Canada**

By David Baird (BSc'41) Red Deer Press ISBN: 0889952752

David Baird's lifelong fascination with lighthouses began nearly 70 years ago when he visited his first lighthouse on Partridge Island in Saint John when he was just 14 years old. In his book, he profiles 260 lighthouses, some chosen for their historical significance, while others were included because of their architecture. Each of the lighthouses is accompanied by interesting facts and directions on how to reach it.

#### Wild Predators? Not In My Backyard!

By Eugene L. Fytche (BScEE'47) Self-published with the assistance of Creative Bound International Inc. ISBN: 1-894439-10-4

A sequel to . . . May Safely Graze, which dealt with protecting livestock from predators, Wild Predators? looks at the responsibility of farmers for their livestock and poultry, tells how to evaluate risk from 20 common wild predators including domestic dogs on the loose evaluates fencing choices, and looks at the effectiveness of guard animals alone or in conjunction with fencing. The book is of particular value to anyone entering agriculture for the first time, and wishes to avoid common pitfalls.

#### Zweimal Verfolgt / Twice Persecuted

By Carolyn Gammon (BPE'81) and Christiane Hemker Publisher: Metropole Verlag, Berlin ISBN: 3-936411-42-5

Zweimal Verfolgt / Twice Persecuted is the life story of Johanna Krause of Dresden, who was persecuted as a Jew both in the Nazi times and in East Germany after the war. Surviving years of terror under the Nazis, Johanna remained in Dresden to help build the 'socialist fatherland,' only to learn that anti-Semitism under the communists was no better. Carolyn Gammon had the privilege of a long friendship with Johanna and the chance to record and write down her life story. The book, currently available in German, is looking for a publisher interested in an English translation.

#### Steal Away

By Linda Hall (Instructor, College of Extended Learning, UNB) Multnomah Publishers Inc. ISBN: 1590520726

Steal Away is Linda Hall's ninth novel. She is the author of eight other novels, including the bestselling Margaret's Peace, and seven

non-fiction works. Steal Away is Linda's first book in a new series featuring private investigator Teri Blake-Addison. Teri is newly married, enjoying her new career as a PI and spends her time finding people. Readers will soon discover Teri often finds a lot more than her customers are asking to be found. In Steal Away, Teri is hired by a well-known minister to find out what really happened to his wife. Five years previously she was in a sailboat accident with two friends off Grand Manan Island. The friends' bodies were found; hers wasn't. The minister wants to get married again yet is troubled by "ghosts of the past" and he wants to put to rest once and for all what happened to his wife.

#### Chat Room

In Chat Room, the dynamic sequel to Steal Away, private investigator Teri Blake-Addison is hired by a young woman to find the woman's best friend, who ran off with a man she met on the internet and hasn't been heard from since. The clues lead her from Maine to Texas to New Mexico and back again. While on her home front, she and husband lack are packing to move into their newly built home, which is anything but ready on time.

#### **Ireland's Eye: Travels**

By Mark Anthony Jarman (Faculty, Dept. of English, UNB Fredericton) House of Anansi Press ISBN: 0-88784-692-0

Ireland's Eye is an intimate, funny, and fascinating account of the intertwined history of a wild nation and family, of city cousins in crowded pubs and country aunts who can't drive, and a mother's failing memory. Jarman finds many Irelands, along with family gossip and The Troubles, barrel-making and blarney, heroin and the roaring new economy. Roving the hedgerows of Kilkenny, the tough storied streets of Dublin, the crooked rubble of the Reek, he transforms Ireland from a distant, mythic place to a fresh, living landscape - an extraordinary travel book from an extraordinary writer.

#### Handbook of Industrial Mixing

Most chapters are written by both an industrialist and an academic. Intended for the practising engineer who needs to both identify and solve mixing problems, this book also provides concise discussions on theoretical background and uses many illustrative examples when covering applications. # New \$60 million capital campaign to involve alumni

The stage is set for the University of New Brunswick to begin one of its most important fund-raising campaigns in our more than 200-year history. I'm pleased to announce that the Forging Our Futures campaign will begin in 2004. The campaign

It's been almost 10 years since The Venture Campaign raised more than \$43 million for the University. This campaign will give us the resources to shape the future, not only of this university, but also of our province and the world around us. # UNB enrolment numbers increase dramatically — 8%

The University of New Brunswick sits atop the Maritime mountain, with enrolment numbers increasing dramatically this fall.

In fact, numbers have reached UNB's former high-water mark of 1996.

"The enrolment for 2003 on UNB's two campuses has increased close to 900 students over last year," said UNB President Dr. John McLaughlin. "We have experienced an increase in students from Ontario and that's not just a reaction from that province's double cohort. Our numbers from New Brunswick, P.E.I. and Western Canada have also grown, as have our international numbers. Competition within the region continues to be strong, but UNB's enrolment gains have surpassed all other Maritime universities."

As of Oct. 1, there were 12,024 students registered in degree programs at UNB. There were 9,007 students at UNB Fredericton and 3,017 at UNB Saint John, an increase of almost eight per cent on both campuses.

A recent re-organization of UNB's recruitment and marketing areas saw the formation of Student Recruitment and Integrated Marketing (SRIM) at UNB Fredericton, Office of Advancement, Communications and Recognition (ACR) at UNB Saint John and the UNB International Recruitment Centre.

At UNB Fredericton, progress is three years ahead of schedule.

"UNB's reputation has grown, demand has risen and we've leaped ahead with large gains," said Susan Mesheau, the director of SRIM. "We enhanced UNB's image with an aggressive and targeted strategy that's paying off. Through a university-wide effort, we differentiated ourselves with our client service approach, bold displays and materials. Our innovative initiatives like Admission on the Spot garnered national media attention."

"At UNB Saint John, we have seen a significant jump in inquiries over the last two years," said David Emerson, the director of ACR. "Our prompt response policy and personalized tour program have turned those inquiries into this year's all-time high in enrolment."

The **Making A Significant Difference** integrated marketing initiative, launched in September 2002, positively affected UNB enrolment and student transfers. This program garnered a gold medal for marketing and branding, competing against universities from around the world.

"The quality of the entire UNB experience — the courses, teachers and support services and the campus life — is what reduces the attrition rate and keeps enrolment figures climbing," said Dr. Kathryn Hamer, UNB Saint John's vice-president. "They are the result of the effort everyone at the university puts in to retain the students we attract."

# \$3M for education research

The Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC) has announced a \$3-million investment in research to help disadvantaged children succeed in the classroom. The research will be led by Doug Willms at UNB in Fredericton.

The grant is not only the largest ever awarded by SSHRC to a UNB researcher but it was also ranked first out of 44 applications from across the country for funding under SSHRC's Collaborative Research Initiatives program.

Under the direction of Dr. Willms, Canada Research Chair in Human Development and professor of education at UNBF, this study on childhood development will focus on helping children overcome disadvantages — especially those related to poverty — associated with difficult family and

community environments.

"Children's ability to learn in the classroom is affected by many factors, ranging from the amount of time their parents spend with them, to whether they are included in extracurricular arts and sports programs, to the environment in the schools they attend," said Dr. Willms. "This work is really about leveling the playing field so that Canadian children have an equal opportunity to succeed, no matter what their background."

The team of researchers from across Canada will explore five key areas: improving the health of infants at birth, creating quality early childhood education programs, building supportive learning environments, helping youth build skills to cope with social exclusion, and assisting communities to better support families.

## \$1M SSHRC grant directed to Saint John study

The Greater Saint John area will become a living laboratory over the next five years thanks to funding provided by Canada's Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC). UNB Saint John, in collaboration with the N.B. Museum, the Atlantic Coastal Action Programme, the Saint John Human Development Council and Peninsula Heritage Inc., has been awarded approximately \$1,000,000 for a project entitled "The Industrial City in Transition." The funding is provided through SSHRC's acclaimed Community-University Research Alliance program.

Dr. Robert MacKinnon, dean of arts at UNB Saint John, will head up the project.

"This unique collaboration between the university and community partners will provide valuable training opportunities for students and will contribute important research results for the community," he said.

Over 30 staff and researchers in areas ranging from sociology, tourism, geography and museum studies to history, literature, biology, geology and education will work on the project, which focuses on four themes:

- The changing demographic and economic base of Greater Saint John;
- The impact of human activity on the city's land, water, and air resources;
- Urban and regional planning strategies and how they have influenced the shape and nature of the city, and;
- The city's cultural diversity, in order to offer new insights for museum exhibits, education programs, and tourism initiatives.

## CIDA provides UNB with \$4M for Bhutan project

UNB in Fredericton will receive \$4 million for its education and cooperation initiatives in the Himalayan Kingdom of Bhutan.

The funds will be provided over the next five years by CIDA, the Canadian International Development Agency.

Since 1985, UNB has played a central role in helping Bhutan to have the

fastest developing system of education in the world.

The \$4 million contribution will be used to support basic education priorities established by the Bhutanese Ministry of Education, including the teaching of English and mathematics. UNBF will provide training and technical assistance.

# UNB-led projects receive \$11.5M from AIF

Eight highly innovative research and development projects in the Fredericton area will receive up to \$11.5 million in federal funding under the Atlantic Innovation Fund (AIF).

The eight projects, all led by UNB researchers, have an estimated total value of more than \$20 million, meaning the project proponents have leveraged considerable funding from a variety of sources.

UNB President John D. McLaughlin said: "We applaud the success of our UNB researchers and their partners in the public and private sector. The eight projects funded demonstrate the leadership role that this university and its researchers play in both the development and application of new technology and the economic growth of the region."

The AIF projects are:

- · Centre for Nuclear Energy Research, UNB Development of Instrumentation for Prevention of Corrosion of Metals;
- · UNB Beyond Kyoto: Atlantic Sustainable R&D Initiatives;
- UNB Development of Nanoparticle Glass-fibre Composites for Dental Posts;
- · UNB Development of Value-Added Fibre Material;
- · UNB Development of an Advanced Effluent Treatment System for Land-Based Aquaculture Facilities;
- · UNB Novel Bioreactor for Wastewater Treatment;
- · UNB Fuzzy Adaptive Tools for Intrusion Detection;
- · Institute of Biomedical Engineering, UNB Wireless eHealth Devices for the Rehabilitation Field.

The \$300-million AIF is a Government of Canada initiative administered by ACOA. It is designed to build the economy of Atlantic Canada by increasing the region's capacity to carry out leading-edge research and development that directly contributes to the development of new technology-based economic activity in the region.

# UNB mourns loss of Dr. Colin B. Mackay


Colin Bridges Mackay, O.C., Q.C., B.A., D.C.L, D.ÈsL, D.Ed., LL.D., president emeritus of the University of New Brunswick, died Nov. 27 at the age of 83.

Dr. Mackay, who served as president of UNB from 1953 to 1969, has been described, along

with Lord Beaverbrook, as the single most influential person in UNB's growth and development during the 20th century.

"Colin B. Mackay was the right man for the right time at UNB," said UNB President John McLaughlin. "He was energetic, committed and indefatigable. He took advantage of every opportunity that came his way to make UNB the best it could possibly be.

"He recognized the potential in the post-War boom and capitalized on it. In a productive partnership with Lord Beaverbrook, he attracted the substantial support this institution needed to expand its facilities, hire talented faculty, and increase its programs, presiding over a period of growth never seen before or since. He under-



stood the value of history and tradition, establishing and celebrating 1785 as our founding date and developing our coat of arms and official flag.

"Over a 16-year period, he transformed UNB from a small provincial college into a comprehensive university with national profile. He is as much a founder of UNB as Ward Chipman, William Payne or Sir Howard Douglas. Indeed, he is the founder of the modern-day UNB."

Born in Rothesay, N.B., in 1920, Dr. Mackay was the son of respected lumber merchant Colin Mackay. His mother's father, H.S. Bridges, was a professor of classics at UNB, and his mother was born in UNB's Old Arts Building.

He received his early education at the Rothesay Collegiate School, following which he attended UNB, graduating in 1942 with a BA.

Dr. Mackay served with the Royal Canadian Navy during the Second World War and commanded a landing craft on the beaches of Normandy during D-Day on June 6, 1944.

Following the war, he entered Harvard Law


School, transferred to the University of British

Columbia and graduated with a bachelor of

lecturer in UNB's faculty of law.

At the age of 33, he was appointed president of UNB, the youngest university president in Canada at that time.

During his years as president, Dr. Mackay oversaw a period of extraordinary growth: enrolment increased 525 per cent, from 767 to 4,792; the faculty increased from 70 to 318; the Saint John campus was established; there was unprecedented development on the Fredericton campus; the Law School in Saint John and St. Thomas University in Chatham both relocated to the Fredericton campus; a plethora of new faculties and programs were created; and the university's budget grew from less than \$1 million to \$13 million. University governance also changed dramatically to include student input. He worked closely with Lord Beaverbrook to transform the university into a comprehensive, national institution.

Dr. Mackay concluded his presidency in 1969 and in 1971 accepted an appointment as executive director of the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada.

He also became active in international affairs, serving on several Canadian delegations to the United Nations and working as an adviser to the Canadian International Development Agency. He helped to foster institutions of higher education in five African nations and in 1980 chaired the evaluation mission of the UN Educational and Training Program for Southern Africa.

An Officer of the Order of Canada and Queen's Counsel, Dr. Mackay received honorary degrees from Mount Allison, UNB, Dalhousie, St. Dunstan's, St. Thomas, Memorial, Western, Colby College, the University of Maine, Laval, and the universities of Botswana, Swaziland and Lesotho.

In 1978 he became UNB's first president emeritus. His extensive record of professional and community service demonstrated his commitment to the community and to society.

Throughout his life, Dr. Mackay remained involved in the life of the university, maintaining an office on the Saint John campus. He was an adviser to his successors and a dedicated supporter of the institution.

Dr. Mackay was predeceased by his wife, Mary Ives (Anglin) in November 2001. He is survived by his sister, Janet Hart of Vancouver, and several cousins, nieces and nephews.

# Almost 350 students now live on campus

UNB Saint John's new residence accepted its first tenants in September, and many of them are saying it's the best residence they've ever seen.

What makes this residence so great? According to students and parents, the fact that each unit is a two-bedroom suite, complete with a kitchenette and washroom, is very attractive. It's a lot more like home, they say, especially since students can bring their own pillows, plants, towels, small kitchen appliances, decorations and so on.

"This is a national-calibre university residence that was designed in response to students' feedback," says Kathy Hamer, UNB's vice-president (Saint John).

"The needs and wants of potential residence students at this university are somewhat different," she says.

"Feedback showed that they would prefer a more independent living environment similar to an apartment. That's why these two-bedroom suites are so popular."

The new \$8.35-million facility features 85 double suites (two single bedrooms with a shared bath and kitchenette). Each room is equipped with high-speed internet, telephone and cable connections, while the common lounges are equipped with TVs, VCRs and DVD players. Completely security locked, both the new residence and the Sir James Dunn Residence are administered by a live-in residence life coordinator, a residence academic coordinator, student residence assistants, a facility manager and appropriate support personnel. While each unit in the new facility has a kitchenette, students are nonetheless welcome to participate in the university's meal plan, which operates on a declining balance system.

With a steady growth in enrolment,

the time was ripe for more on-campus housing, according to Dr. Hamer.

"This residence is a testimonial to the success UNB Saint John has experienced, and an investment in the kind of continued change necessary to sustain that success," she says. "It further strengthens the wonderful experience students have at UNB Saint John, making us an even more attractive choice for Canadian students."

Every residence room — in the new facility and in the more traditionally-designed Sir James Dunn Residence — is booked.

"According to our present student residents, living in residence is a great way to make friends quickly and get involved with campus life," says Dr. Hamer. "They find it's fun to live on campus, so close to everything.

"With almost 350 residents, UNB Saint John has more than tripled the number of people living and learning on the university grounds," says Dr. Hamer.

New MBA in forest products marketing graduates first class UNB's new MBA program in forest products marketing graduated its first class in October. Students attended business courses on the Saint John campus from October to May, and then moved to Fredericton to take forest products courses from May to September.

Program highlights included courses taught by visiting professors Dr. Rob Kozak and Dr. Dave Cohen from the University of British Columbia, guest speakers from government and industry,

and field trips to processing facilities around the province. Students completed the program by creating marketing plans for local wood processing companies, and by working with the Boiestown community to analyse a sawmill buyout.

UNB President John McLaughlin releases his first-year report

What a remarkable year it has been!

Since John D. McLaughlin was installed as UNB's 17th president and vice-chancellor on Oct. 25, 2002, the university has made significant strides in a number of important areas.

Fresh on the heels of the launch of Phase Two of the Making a Significant Difference initiative in September (see Fall 2003 issue of Alumni News), Dr. McLaughlin released an account of his first year in office titled *The State of Our University: The President's First-Year Report*.

In the report, Dr. McLaughlin cites literally dozens of examples of the progress UNB has made in areas ranging from research funding to enrolment to new academic initiatives.

All the accomplishments he outlines are part of the vision he articulated when he took office in 2002.

"The three pillars of my vision are: sustaining and furthering UNB's role as a national university, advancing UNB's role as a learning institution, and promoting UNB's fundamental role in the economic, social and cultural well-being of the province and Atlantic Canada," Dr. McLaughlin said. "Although five years is not much time in which to make significant gains toward these important goals, the accomplishments of 2002-03 bode well for the future but at the same

time demonstrate how much further we have to go."

# MAKING A SIGNIFICANT DIFFERENCE

**Gary Saunders** 

**Top researcher:** Recipient of one of NSERC's Steacie Fellowships, the nation's leading research award

The notion that life evolves from simple organisms to more complex ones is being challenged by Gary Saunders. A biology professor at UNBF, Dr. Saunders was awarded a 2003 NSERC Steacie Fellowship — Canada's premier science and engineering honour. He also holds the Canada Research Chair in Molecular Systematics and Biodiversity at UNBF.

"There's this view that a lot of people have, and remarkably a lot of biologists seem stuck with, that evolution always goes from simple to complex," said Dr. Saunders, one of Canada's few researchers in the taxonomy and systematics of algae.

"That's not always the case. What we've found, contrary to previous thinking, is that some of the simplest red algae are some of the most recently evolved ones. So at one level we're turning our understanding of algal evolution upside down."

Red algae (Rhodophyta) range from microscopic single-celled creatures to large algae such as Irish Moss. They are found worldwide in marine tidal zones, and there are as many as 7,000 species in total.

"I would say that the average person doesn't get through the day without red algae as part of his or her life," said Dr. Saunders, who has travelled to shorelines from British Columbia to Australia and Chile in search of new algal species.

The polysaccharides found in red algae are used to produce the emulsifiers and thickeners in products ranging from ice cream to cosmetics.

Dr. Saunders' research of the past decade has pioneered the use of new genetic analyses to reinterpret the evolutionary history and familial relationships of red algae, and several other algal groups.

While an NSERC (Natural Science and Engineering Research Council of Canada) Steacie Fellow, Dr. Saunders will be looking for new genetic markers to plug holes in his ongoing gene-based reassessment of red algal relationships. The research is important in the search for new economically valuable red algae, he says. It provides information on which species of red algae are most closely related, and thus most likely to have similar properties.

The Steacie research will also make the link between the genetics of red algae and the algae's bizarre range of reproductive strategies, research that could further challenge commonly held notions about evolution.

"The animals and land plants are two little bumps on the tree of life from a planetary biodiversity perspective," noted Dr. Saunders. "I think a lot of our ideas on how evolution has shaped life may change when we look further at red algae."

# Nancy Mathis

# Top innovator:

Recipient of the 2003 Manning Award for her innovative thermal technology

Mathis Instruments Ltd.'s non-invasive thermal effusivity sensors are providing researchers, manufacturers and quality-control professionals with unprecedented speed, accuracy and flexibility in determining the heat-transferring characteristics of a wide range of materials.

Nancy Mathis (PhD'96) of Fredericton has won the annual \$100,000 Manning Principal Award for her remarkable innovation, being used in dozens of research and commercial applications in the pharmaceutical, aerospace, automotive, petroleum and electronics industries.

Since 1982, the Ernest C. Manning Award Foundation's annual awards program has encouraged and recognized leading Canadian innovators with more than \$3 million in prize money.

The sensors developed by Dr. Mathis, president and CEO of Mathis Instruments, rapidly and non-destructively measure thermal effusivity and conductivity — unique properties related to a material's ability to transfer heat.

Dr. Mathis' highly portable and adaptable sensors are used for quality control of materials in the laboratory, during production, and for the testing of finished goods.

The sensors are used around the world by leading research organizations and major companies, including Wyeth, IBM, Exxon Mobil, Dow Corning, General Electric, Pioneer, Whirlpool, GlaxoSmithKline, and Avery Dennison.

Dr. Mathis developed her sensor technology while doing her PhD in chemical engineering at UNB, but her relationship with UNB continued and flourished long after she graduated. She and her husband Chris (BScME'93) founded Mathis Instruments in 1995, and the company's first home was in what was then known as the Incutech building on the Fredericton campus. Incutech has since become Enterprise UNB, an entrepreneurial development centre.

Dr. Mathis said her company's eight years of development at Incutech/Enterprise UNB was vital to its success.

"When we moved into Enterprise UNB, then Incutech,



we had one employee and 100 square feet," Dr. Mathis said. "While we were there, we added 18 employees and expanded nine times to over 3,500 square feet. The ability to grow at a controlled pace was very important to us."

Enterprise UNB also provided internet and telecommunications services, and access to business equipment.

"When we started we had nothing but a stapler," Dr. Mathis said. "Having access to a photocopier, a fax machine, and binding machine for proposals was important."

Last spring, Mathis Instruments growth had reached the point where the company moved off-campus to new quarters in Fredericton.

**Top professor:** Recipient of a 3M Teaching Fellowship, Canada's premier teaching honour

Pierre Zundel was honoured individually, but he's not about to accept the accolades by himself.

A professor of forestry at UNB in Fredericton, Dr. Zundel received a 2003 3M Teaching Fellowship, one of eight presented in the nation. The fellowships are presented to individuals who excel in the teaching of their own courses while demonstrating an exceptionally high degree of leadership and commitment to the improvement of university teaching across disciplines.

Dr. Zundel helped design UNBF's Renaissance College program in interdisciplinary leadership studies while spearheading an innovative curriculum using problem-based learning and teaching in the faculty of forestry and environmental management.

"You feel gratified, but there's a mixture of emotions," said Dr. Zundel on his award. "I've worked with people for 10 to 15 years and you want the award to go to all of them. So many people played a part in this."

Dr. Zundel was the winner of the first UNB Teaching Professor Award and earned the 2002 Atlantic Association of Universities Instructional Leadership Award. He has been an outspoken advocate of excellence in teaching throughout UNBF.

Although Dr. Zundel isn't trying to re-invent the teaching wheel, he's interested in enhancing his profession. "We're still doing a lot of things from the 1950s and 1960s, standing up and talking to a large group of people in lecture mode," he said. "That's effective, but you don't become a problem solver or competent communicator by being spoken to. Teaching requires engaging students in activities."

Dr. Zundel, with UNBF since 1991, indicated today's students are comfortable working in groups. He places much of the learning onus on students, who may resist initially, but quickly realize the approach is effective.

"When you ask students to take more responsibility for their learning, they're not happy at first," Dr. Zundel said. "They've been brought up expecting the teacher to tell them what they need to know and then test them on it. We're guiding activities and providing feedback. We're teaching people to think, to express themselves, to connect with big ideas and become a competent practitioner of some profession."

One of the main roles of 3M Teaching Fellows is to advocate for improvements in the Canadian university system. Dr. Zundel and some of his recently appointed fellows would like the federal government to develop Canada Teaching Chairs to provide resources for universities to complement the existing Canada Research Chairs. It would allow those universities to invest in people whose main job would be to improve the quality of teaching.

The 3M Teaching Fellowship recognizes excellence in teachers of veterinary medicine, engineering, business, humanities, agriculture, social sciences, medicine, sciences, nursing, education, law and dentistry.

# The Old Arts Building

# Enduring edifice marks 175 years

'Firm may this institution ever stand and flourish firm in the liberal constitution and Royal foundation on which I have this day instituted it enlarging and extending its material form, and all its capacities to do good, to meet the increasing demands of a rising, prosperous, and intellectual people; and may it soon acquire, and ever maintain, a high and distinguished reputation, as a place of general learning and useful knowledge.'

> — Sir Howard Douglas, Lieutenant-Governor of N.B., January 1, 1829

he stirring words to the left were spoken by Sir Howard Douglas on Jan. 1, 1829, during the official opening of one of the most enduring symbols of UNB, the Old Arts Building.

Those words, as true today as they were then, rang out again in the Great Hall of the building on Jan. 1, 2004, as the university marked the 175th anniversary of what today is officially known as Sir Howard Douglas Hall, but to many is still the 'Old Arts Building.' The celebrations also marked the 175th anniversary of the constituting of King's College, which in 1859 was to become the University of New Brunswick.

One of the great strengths of UNB is its history and tradition, now stretching over the past 218 years, and the Old Arts Building is very much the

icon that represents that rich historical background. But this majestic collection of stone and mortar and wood is also more than that, according to UNB President John McLaughlin.

"While it is an excellent piece of architecture in itself, the Old Arts Building represents much more than just its physical presence," Dr. McLaughlin said.

"It is the embodiment of what UNB is all about — the education of the citizens of this province and beyond. It represents the intellectual capacity this institution has contributed to the social, economic and cultural fabric of this region for more than 200 years."

Much of the credit for construction of the Old Arts Building must be given to Sir Howard Douglas, who was appointed



lieutenant-governor of New Brunswick in 1824. He took a keen interest in the fledgling institution then known as the College of New Brunswick.

The New College Building, as it was known at the time, began to take shape in 1825 when Douglas became personally involved in its construction. In March of that year, three designs were submitted: one from a Mr. Johnston: one from J.E. Woolford. who was barracks master and the architect of Government House, residence of the lieutenant-governor; and one from the Rev. George Best, archdeacon of the province, a member of the college senate, and later, King's College's titular president. Woolford's design was chosen, for which he was paid £25, and the design was later simplified to cut the cost of construction.

As was all too frequently the case in college matters, the siting and construction of the building were fraught with difficulties. The initial site selected by Douglas to the east of the

Maryland Road (Regent Street) proved unavailable because of a dispute between the owner and his neighbour. A nearby site, Lot 20, owned by a Mr. Best, was available for £500, which the senate refused to pay until the lieutenant-governor insisted they do so in February 1826.

A budget of £12,000 was set and tenders were called. William Cross and John Murray were the low bidders at £9,000, though they subsequently revised their price to £11,500. Ultimately, Cross and Murray, along with James Taylor and Co., were hired for a price of £10,300 in July 1826. Construction was halted during the winter of 1827-28 and the building still lacked finishing touches when it was officially opened on Jan. 1, 1829.

A third storey was added to the building in 1876-77 after a proposal to build a second building was judged too expensive. The addition, which was intended to house a museum, a lecture room for Loring Woart Bailey and a

library, was designed by Lemuel Nason of Fredericton and built at a cost of \$7,775 by Hartwell B. Crosby of Saint John. Accusations of shoddy workmanship and use of inferior materials plagued the project, and the leaking of the mansard roof remained a problem through the 1880s.

Until 1900 the Old Arts Building was UNB's only major facility. In it, faculty, students and staff resided, meals were served, church services held and classes conducted. The building was staffed by a steward who prepared and served the food, including breakfast in the students' rooms; a forester who kept the college supplied with firewood; a beadle who delivered messages for the professors and enforced discipline among the students; and a porter who answered the door, stacked wood and did maintenance.

As early as 1872 running water was brought into the basement of the building. Some electric lighting was available by 1898. In 1907 Chancellor C.C. Jones was allowed by the senate to

have a bathroom installed in his residential apartments on the first floor.

UNB stopped housing students in the Old Arts Building in 1904. In the mid-1940s faculty accommodations were discontinued as the numbers of returning veterans necessitated that bedrooms be transformed into classrooms. Permanent residence ceased altogether in 1952 when President Albert Trueman and his family moved to Somerville House on Waterloo Row.

Today, the building houses the offices of the president and other senior administrators, the registrar's office, and several other UNB departments. It is believed to be the oldest university building in Canada that is still in continuous use.

And may it still be in use 175 years from now.

# What's in a name . . . the origin of the 'Old'

Just out of curiosity, *Alumni News* decided to track down when the Old Arts Building started being referred to as the OLD Arts Building.

Short answer: Around 1960, as near as we can figure.

Long answer: Around 1960, as near as we can figure by looking for references to the building in old publications.

For example, the Archives in the Harriet Irving Library has a couple of postcards from the 1930s that show the 'Arts Building.' All UNB yearbooks through the 1930s, 1940s and 1950s also consistently refer to the 'Arts Building.'

The event that prompted the transition to use of 'Old' in reference to the Arts Building came in October 1960 with the opening of Sir Thomas Carleton Hall, which was referred to in the *Alumni News* of December 1960 as the "new arts building."

In the same edition, the Arts Building became the "old arts building." Note the lower case. But by the time 1966 rolled around, the use of the phrase 'old' had

been formalized, as exemplified by the use of 'Old Arts Building' (capitalized) in the *Brunswickan* pages of the 1966 yearbook.

One other curious thing . . . .

In the 1961 yearbook, a photo of the Old Arts Building bore the caption "Douglas Hall," while in the 1962 yearbook it was referred to as "Sir Howard Douglas Hall."

The formal names never took, apparently, because the reference disappeared after that until October 1999, when the Old Arts Building was officially designated Sir Howard Douglas Hall.

# Educating Engineers

# UNB has been at it for 150 years now

It all began on Feb. 15, 1854, when 26 young men sat down in Fredericton to take a new course offering, among other things, instruction in "Methods of Surveying with Theodolite, Circumferentor, &c.; Construction, Use and Adjustment of the Instruments used by Engineers, both for field and office work; . . . "

The course was offered at UNB, and gave the university a claim to being the first institution in Canada to include engineering in its curriculum.

Now, 150 years later and after graduating more than 9,000 engineers, the Faculty of Engineering is marking the anniversary with a series of events on the Fredericton campus. And as many engineering alumni as possible are asked to attend.

The lineup of activities includes:

- Wednesday, Feb. 11: Black tie dinner at Delta Fredericton. Guest speaker J. Marvin MaGee (BScME'75), P. Eng., President and CEO of Celestica Inc.;
- Thursday, Feb. 12: Symposium: Engineering Education A Look Back from the Year 2154;
- Friday, Feb 13: Student/Alumni event at SUB cafeteria with two bands: Signal Hill and The Travoltas. This event also will feature a multimedia presentation on the history of engineering at UNB;
- Sunday and Monday, Feb. 15-16: All-department open houses at Sir Edmund Head Hall.

UNB really began in the mind of Sir Edmund Head, who had been appointed N.B. lieutenant-governor in 1847. He saw the need for practical education at the then-King's College, and on Sept. 17, 1853, wrote the College Council that he had for some time been considering "the best mode... of obtaining instruction in Civil Engineering..." He had even gone so far as to contact a Mr. Giles, chief engineer of the engineering firm Messrs Jackson & Co.

Giles, in turn, informed Head that a member of his staff, one McMahon Cregan, was in every way qualified to teach what Head had in mind. Cregan agreed to take on the task for a fee of £100. Students would pay a fee of 10 shillings by those who were registered at King's College, or £2 if they were not — the fees then going to the instructor.

Things moved quickly. By Dec. 10, 1853, a notice had appeared in the

New Brunswick Courier that "A COURSE of instruction in Civil Engineering will be given at King's College" commencing on Feb. 15, 1854, and continuing until the end of April. The rest is history.

Engineering education became a mainstay of UNB after that. Throughout the rest of the 19th century courses continued to be offered, and by the 1890s the university was awarding diplomas in civil engineering. According to the official university Register of graduates, published in 1924, the first bachelor of science in civil engineering degrees were awarded in 1907. The first BSc in electrical engineering was awarded in 1910.

At the end of the Second World War, the Faculty of Engineering expanded exponentially in terms of both faculty and students. The faculty began awarding degrees in mechanical engineering in the early 1950s, and in surveying (now geodesy and geomatics engineering) and chemical engineering in the early 1960s.

Today, the department of electrical engineering has expanded so that it is now the department of electrical and computer engineering. As well, says Dean of Engineering David Coleman, the faculty works hand-in-hand with the Faculty of Forestry on the forest engineering program, and with the Faculty of Science on the geological engineering program.

Engineering, says Dean Coleman, is and will continue to be one of UNB's greatest strengths.

# Association raises \$1,850 for food banks





# UNB baseball team captures national title

UNB Fredericton athletes captured another national championship this fall.

The UNB Caris Cougars men's baseball team won the national university championship Oct. 19 with a 3-0 win over the Laval Rouge et Or in Montreal.

It was the first national title for the Cougars, who won silver medals in the national tournaments in 1998 and 2001. Their victory was particularly sweet by virtue of beating Laval, the team that defeated the Cougars for the national title in 2001 in a game that lasted 15 innings.

Let-hander Jay Magee, a thirdyear education student, took the mound win for the Cougars, pitching a three-hit shutout. Curtis Chiasson, a second-year arts student, was named tournament MVP.

In the semi-finals, the Cougars beat Saint Mary's Huskies 4-2 to advance to the gold medal game.

Going into the national tourney, the Cougars, under head coach Mark Clark, were rated No. 1 in the Canadian Intercollegiate Baseball Association, which has four conferences that include 22 teams from universities in the Maritimes, Quebec and Ontario.

The Cougars were also coming off their sixth consecutive Atlantic Conference title.

Formed in 1998, the Cougars are a club team, as opposed to a varsity V-Reds team. The team is managed by the students with much assistance from the volunteer coaching staff.

All sanctioned clubs operate within the established sport club policies and procedures of the university under supervision of the director of campus recreation.

In 1998, the varsity V-Reds men's hockey team captured a national championship, and in 1980 the Red Shirts varsity men's soccer team won a national intercollegiate championship in their sport.

UNB will host the 2006 Canadian Interuniversity Sport (CIS) women's basketball championship.

"This particular CIS championship

has not been held in the Atlantic Conference since 1992 at UPEI, and to bring the event to UNB in 2006, with a later stop in the Maritimes at Memorial in 2007, can only prove beneficial for the development of women's basketball in this part of the country," added Mr. Love.

The UNB athletics department is excited to have another national event come to the UNB campus. Athletic Director Clint Hamilton said, "Hosting this championship is another example of how UNB can partner with our community to deliver a major national event.
