

Eddy Campbell Leads Canadian Delegation to Ukraine

EDUCATION MISSION FIRST OF ITS KIND

WITH THE AIM of strengthening Ukrainian-Canadian higher education partnerships, UNB President Eddy Campbell recently co-led a delegation of 15 senior education leaders from 12 Canadian institutions to Ukraine.

Sponsored by the Canadian Bureau for International Education (CBIE), the mission was the first of its kind to visit Ukraine

The goal of the trip was to bring together administrators from both countries to talk about opportunities for collaborative research, faculty and student exchanges, and other partnerships.

The mission included the signing of a memorandum of understanding between CBIE and the Union of Rectors of Higher Educational Institutions of Ukraine, formalizing their commitment to work to broaden the Ukraine-Canada bilateral relationship in higher education and research.

"Finding ways to collaborate more with colleges and universities abroad is the key to attracting more international students to Canadian universities," says Campbell.

Noting UNB's goal of increasing its international student population by 25 per cent, Campbell said the international student presence in Canada enriches more than just the immediate campus community.

"You just think of the contribution to an economy that an additional couple of hundred international students make and now you're really talking about something on the order of opening a whole new industry or attracting a whole new corporation to set up shop in New Brunswick," he says.

Throughout the week, several other memoranda of understanding were signed by individual institutions formalizing a commitment to co-operation around higher education partnerships in selected areas.

SEVENTEEN NEW STUDENTS INDUCTED INTO SIR HOWARD DOUGLAS SOCIETY

SEVENTEEN UNB students have joined 138 students before them as inductees into the Sir Howard Douglas Society of Scholars.

The award recipients volunteer their time and talents in a number of ways, both locally and internationally, and are all dean's list students. Nominated by their faculties, the scholars must have completed two years of their bachelor's degree program, achieved academic excellence, and actively participated in co-curricular or extracurricular activities.

A dinner was held in their honour on March 14, where the 2013 scholars were addressed by UNB alumni and past Sir Howard Douglas Scholars, Jon O'Kane (BSc'10) and Ryan Brideau (BSc'11).

Members of the Sir Howard Douglas Society, formed in 2006, have the opportunity to participate in special university events and become part of a network of outstanding students. As the honour society grows each year, new members have the opportunity to meet and interact with past recipients of the Sir Howard Douglas Award.

Born in Scotland, Sir Howard Douglas served as lieutenant-governor of New Brunswick from 1823 to 1831. During his term, he encouraged development, sought support for native peoples, improved communications and promoted education. Sir Howard was a founder and the first chancellor of King's College Fredericton, predecessor to UNB.


"It is also an opportunity for us to explain the role of the Associated Alumnae and encourage participation when students graduate," says Karen.

By donating league dues and prize winnings and organizing corporate matching programs, they have contributed over \$2,000 to the Viator Award fund to further Geyssen's legacy.

"Dr. Geyssen was a part of our league for a few years and a close friend and former professor to a few members," says Steve Small (BScChE'03), who lives in Calgary. "When he passed, we decided we were going to donate our league dues to the Viator Award as we knew this was something Dr. Geyssen was passionate about."

ALUMNUS WINS MINING'S 'ACADEMY AWARD' FOR GOLD DISCOVERY

BOB QUARTERMAIN (BSc'77, DSc'09) credits his 35 years in the mining business for recognizing the hidden value deep beneath the surface of the Valley of the Kings.

Quartermain's two year old company, Pretium Resources, was honoured by the Prospectors and Developers Association of Canada (PDAC) for identifying and efficiently developing the Valley of the Kings deposit into a world class high grade gold deposit.

In announcing the win, PDAC commended Pretium for a successful exploration program that led to a high grade mineral resource base of 8.5 million ounces of gold at the deposit site, which is near Stewart in northwest British Columbia.

Quartermain said Canada's mining industry watches the PDAC awards closely and he's heard them called Canada's Academy Awards for geologists. "To be awarded this prestigious honour is not only a great corporate achievement for such a young company, it is a significant personal one too," he says.

ALUMNUS HONOURED FOR NORTHERN ONTARIO MINING PROJECTS

Stephen Demmings (BA'72), and the company he heads up, recently earned international accolades for their innovative work in the mining sector.

Residing in Thunder Bay, O.N., Demmings is CEO of the city's Community Economic Development Commission (CEDC). Last October at the fourth annual North American Strategic Infrastructure Leadership Forum in Denver, CO., Demmings accepted two awards on behalf of Thunder Bay's CEDC: Strategic Project of the Year and Job Opportunity Creation Project of the Year.

The Strategic Project of the Year Award is the most prestigious prize offered at the yearly forum. The award is for projects that will generate a major increase in productivity and/or competitiveness in a country or region.

The Job Opportunity Creation Award is for projects that will create the greatest number of jobs and/or businesses over the lifetime of the project.



ALUMNUS CITES OPTIMISM AND UNB AS INFLUENTIAL FACTORS

Peter Dimmell (Class of '69, BSc'86) holds a drill core with flecks of silver in it that are 580 million years old. Dimmell carries this to show potential investors the results of recent drilling on the Big Easy gold/silver property in Eastern Newfoundland and the overall possibilities for junior mining exploration in Atlantic Canada.

As president and CEO of Silver Spruce Resources, Dimmell has exploration projects in precious metals (gold/silver), uranium and rare earths, mainly in Newfoundland. He also has an optimistic outlook, which he describes as a personality pre requisite for the industry.

"We're naturally optimistic," he says. "If you weren't optimistic, you wouldn't be able to do it." But attitude isn't the only requirement for success.

"It's partly luck, lots of smarts, and you have to be able to network and raise money," he adds.

He notes that it has been a slow period over the last few years, due to the economic problems in 2008, and more recent problems in the Eurozone, but hopes there will be renewed interest in junior exploration in the next year or so, as the sector typically comes and goes in waves.

He credits UNB with giving him a good grounding in economic geology and names the late professors Arnie McAllister and Ernie Hale as mentors. He's kept in touch with classmates over his career, which started with Noranda in Gander, N.L., and Bathurst, N.B. He became a mineral exploration consultant in 1992, which ultimately led to his serving as president of the Prospectors and Developers Association of Canada in 2002/03.





UNB SHINES AT EAST COAST START-UP WEEK

Event gave early-stage entrepreneurs the chance to connect with leaders in the field

THE FIRST EVER East Coast Start Up Week, the province's biggest festival dedicated to inno vation and the entrepreneurial spirit, was held between March 20 and 24 in Fredericton.

Startup week was co organized by UNB's Pond Deshpande Centre for Innovation and Entrepreneurship and the J.Herbert Smith Centre for Technology Management and Entrepreneurship, along with PropelICT/Launch 36, User Events, the New Brunswick Innovation Foundation (NBIF), and Startup Kitchen. The event gave early stage entrepre

neurs the chance to connect with successful entrepreneurs and innovators and solicit advice from leaders in the field.

UNB's entrepreneurial strengths were in full display at the annual NBIF Breakthru competition, which took place during Startup Week, with four of the five finalists being from UNB.

In all, more than 30 new business ventures were vetted through Startup Week's activities.

UNB Saint John Alumni Have Fond Memories of Their Alma Mater

CAMPUS PREPARES TO CELEBRATE 50TH ANNIVERSARY



AS THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY of the Saint John campus nears, alumni are taking time to recall the fond memories they had while at UNB Saint John.

Stan Devine (BA'74) reflects on his time at UNB Saint John as life changing. "Deep friendships developed amongst students and professors that have continued through the years," he says. With three sons in various stages of post-secondary education, Devine completely understands the importance of a university degree. "I can see that it is both relevant and necessary in order to offer part of a complete education, both academically and personally," he says.

Judy Weeks' (BBA'77) involvement in the Saint John campus continued long after she served as class valedictorian. She says she felt part of the UNB community right from the get-go.

"With small classes we really became our own community," says Weeks. "It was an exciting time since everything was new and we were all together in one spot, not spread all over town."

The Class of 1974 was the first to graduate from the Saint John campus. Before this, students had to transfer to the Fredericton campus to complete their programs.

Peter LeBlanc (BBA'74) explains that the class of 34 students became close when, in 1972, third-year classes were secured for the following year. Similar good news followed in 1973, allowing for fourth- and final-year studies in 1974.

While the official graduation ceremony was held in Fredericton, this group of pioneers decided to take

matters into their own hands and hold a separate graduation ceremony in Ganong Hall. As class president, LeBlanc gave class remarks at the unofficial Saint John graduation "We even designed our own graduation rings," he says.

Wendy Cornfield (BA'75, MEd'93, BEd'95) not only was the first in her family to graduate from university, she went on to earn three degrees.

Cornfield attended UNB Saint John because she recognized the quality of education available in her backyard and could save the expense of leaving home. Her graduating class of 43, in 1975, was the first to walk across the stage at Ganong Hall, but they had to do it twice. "Dr. Elliot (vice-president UNB Saint John) didn't think it was done nicely enough the first time," she jokes.

Gary Lawson (BBA'76, LLB'79) enjoyed many of the same benefits UNB Saint John offered: the small student population, a reasonably priced education, and the fact that he could walk to campus from where he lived.

Active in a variety of student activities, Lawson credits losing his bid as president of the Students' Representative Council as one of his greatest learning experiences.

"I learned that you will always survive and to never take something on unless you think you can win," he says. "UNB Saint John was just a fantastic experience. I couldn't have had a better all-around education anywhere else."

UNB Saint John will be celebrating its 50th anniversary in 2014.

She and her husband Barry Beckett (PhD'70), long-time chemistry professor, registrar, president of the Associated Alumni from 2005 to 2006, and registrar emeritus, have been closely associated with UNBSJ since arriving in Saint John in 1966.

Flora taught mathematics at UNB from 1975 until her retirement in 1998. She taught the first UNB course at Beijing Concord College in China and was the first coordinator of the Math Help Centre on the Saint John campus. Always kind and caring, appreciative of everything and everyone, Flora was beloved by many at UNB. Many of our university's graduates who sat through Flora's math classes still talk of her keen skills with numbers, endless patience with questions, and

openness and accessibility to any and all students.

Flora was also very involved in alumni activities during the years that Barry was a member of Alumni Council, especially while he was president. They travelled widely and enthusiastically, meeting alumni across Canada and beyond.

In 2011, Flora was awarded honorary membership in the UNB Associated Alumni for her outstanding service to the university community. In recognition of her caring and dedication, the Math and Science Help Centre in the Hans W. Klohn Commons will be named after her.

Flora touched the lives of many – her colleagues, friends, students and acquaintances, and was much loved and respected by everyone who had the pleasure to know her.

Levi Lawrence owns and operates Real Food Connections (RFC), a company that provides fresh, local and whenever possible, organic foods to your door.

AFTER TRAVELLING the world with his now wife, Kim, and eating fresh, local food at many restaurants and hotels, Levi Lawrence (BBA'11) returned to Fredericton knowing he wanted to find a way to provide New Brunswickers with easier access to local food. It wasn't until he jumped at the opportunity to build a business plan and pitch his idea to local, successful entrepreneurs through UNB's International Business and Entrepreneurship Centre's annual business plan competition that he saw his vision become a reality.

Real Food Connections (RFC), a company that provides fresh, local and, whenever possible, organic food to your door, has been in business for three years and continues to grow in popularity. Last year, they grew their business by opening a store and are expanding their delivery service to Saint John and Moncton. The success RFC has seen over the past few years proves that Lawrence was not alone in

Davidson says his time at UNB played a role in his success.

"UNB was integral in all that – after all, many of the stories germinated there, and lo and behold these many years later something pretty cool came of it."

YEARS OF THE UNB
ASSOCIATED ALUMNI

THE IDEA OF an official UNB Alumni Association took root on the evening of Nov. 1, 1862, when seven alumni met in the YMCA room of Judge Ritchie's building in Saint John. At that point there were only about 200 former students and graduates, including those who had attended the College of New Brunswick from 1800 to 1828 and King's College from 1829 until 1859. It had not been the best of times for their alma mater.

The institution had undergone a major reorganization followed by a bitter controversy when its former principal, Edwin Jacob, was replaced by Joseph Hea, who only a few months later was forced to resign due to "undignified conduct" and "violent and intemperate language." But the alumni who met that November evening were committed to organizing in support of their university. They mailed a letter to the alumni living in New Brunswick whose whereabouts they could determine.

Six weeks later the small group again met in Saint John, and, having received a number of encouraging letters, decided to establish an "alumni society." A motion made by Mr. G. S. Smith, Class of 1854, was unanimously passed "that the objects of such a society be first, the advancement of the interests of the University of New Brunswick by all honourable means,

and second, the promotion of good feeling and friendly intercourse among all alumni," passed unanimously.

A committee made up of the President of the university, William Brydone Jack, and alumni James Disbrow, Frederick Barker and James Peters, agreed to prepare a constitution and a set of by-laws. They worked through the Christmas holiday season, and on Dec. 30 their proposed constitution was approved.

As a result, the formation and first annual meeting of the Associated Alumni of the University of New Brunswick was held in Saint John five months later, on May 14, 1863. Its main order of business was to admit 25 charter members into the Association.

Although their numbers were small, this did not daunt the eager founders of the society. They immediately created the Alumni Medal "to stimulate the students to extra exertions," and then at their Encaenia meeting in June 1866 a committee was appointed "to take into consideration the propriety and ascertain the probable expense of having dinner among the alumni at the next Encaenia." Thus the first alumni dinner was held on the university campus during Encaenia Week 1867, just as the new Canadian nation began.

\$2.5-million Bequest Provides Opportunities Shirley Cooper Never Had

UNIVERSITY WAS NOT AN OPTION FOR SHIRLEY AND HER HUSBAND



WHEN ASKED about attending university as a young woman, Shirley Cooper (1931-2011) said it just wasn't in the cards. She described it as an option not available to either her or her husband Roy.

However, that option will now be available for many young people thanks to a \$2.5 million bequest from Shirley Cooper to the J. Roy and Shirley L. Cooper Bursary at the University of New Brunswick.

The J. Roy and Shirley L. Cooper bursaries provide students with tuition for one year, and are renewable.

Roy, who passed away in 2001, was a Royal Canadian Air Force veteran from World War II and retired as a supervisor with Canada Post. As for Shirley, whether it was providing students with the gift of music through her time as an organist, choir director, voice coach and piano teacher, or giving her time and money to 31 charitable organizations, she touched many lives.

One of the inaugural recipients of the bursary, Heather MacLean, said she's not the only one the award is helping.

"Not only did it benefit me, it benefited my whole family," the nursing student said. "My husband and I are raising two children while I attend UNB nursing, so having this financial blessing has certainly made our lives easier. I sincerely appreciate this gift from the Cooper family, and admire the commitment that they have shown UNB."

Wendy Russell, a third-year nursing student on the Saint John campus, also received the bursary and is benefitting from the Coopers' generosity.

BILL LEWIS (BScEE'62, DLitt'01) was an avid traveller who wanted to experience what the world had to offer. A regular participant in UNB alumni travel programs, Bill also took the opportunity to participate in the UNB Travel Study program in Rome led by, among others, Peter Kent (BA'59, BEd'65), professor emeritus in history and dean emeritus. Shortly before Bill passed away in 2011, he established the Peter C. Kent Travel Study Award, which provides support to UNB students who want to participate in a course of study outside of Canada.

Bradley Condon of Quispamsis, N.B., a third-year UNB arts student majoring in psychology on the Saint John campus, is the inaugural recipient of the award. Bradley will join more than a dozen other students as they live and study in the Eternal City from May

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Carrying on a son's love of teaching

Bradley Whipple's engaging personality, love of travel and desire to make a difference meshed perfectly with his dream to teach.

Shortly after Bradley graduated from UNB's kinesiology program in 1999, his professional passion focused on one particular ambition – teaching English to foreign students. Whether it was at the Modern Languages Lab that now bears his name on UNB's Saint John campus or on one of his many journeys abroad, Bradley excelled at teaching.

Students were drawn to his quick wit and his patience and he was thrilled to help their linguistic development. His parents, Trina and Bob Whipple say it was readily apparent Bradley loved his students and his students loved him. "That was the best thing," Trina said. "He had the most fun when he was teaching."

Bradley's ambition led him to a number of countries after his graduation, ranging from Sienna, Italy and Torreon, Mexico and eventually to Heredia, Costa Rica as he developed his foreign-language skills and assisted others with English. In 2002, while working at the Hispano American University, Bradley was killed in a robbery attempt as he walked near his apartment.


In the days and weeks following Bradley's death, Trina and Bob received an overwhelming amount of compassionate correspondence, much of it from Bradley's friends and colleagues, including a large amount from the international centres. "They all came to the same description of Bradley – he was the centerpiece of the foreign groups," Bob said.

Trina and Bob are proud of their son's accomplishments and want to continue his mission of teaching English as a second language. They established the Bradley Michael Whipple (BMW) Memorial Bursary in 2006, ensuring Bradley's name will live on through the students they support. Currently one bursary is awarded to a promising student with financial need from Saint John College. Through a bequest, they are hoping to help more while saluting their son's commitment to teaching and his involvement with UNB.

"There are very few physical things that we can do that are in direct relation to our son. He is only in our memory," Bob said. "This is something that is tangible and people can benefit from. This gives us a great deal of pleasure."
