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## Trainee Spotlight

### Postdoctoral Fellow, Luke MacNeill

Dr. Luke MacNeill is a postdoctoral fellow with the Centre for Research in Integrated Care (CRIC). Luke earned his PhD in experimental psychology from the University of New Brunswick in Saint John. His graduate work focused broadly on the areas of mass media and health psychology. For his postdoctoral work, Luke is concentrating on the use of artificial intelligence in healthcare. One of his major research projects is evaluating the usefulness of an artificial intelligence smartphone "app" for improving mental health among people with chronic health conditions, particularly arthritis and diabetes. This project is funded through the New Brunswick Innovation Foundation (NBIF)'s Research Professional Initiative. In conjunction with this project, Luke is leading several studies that focus on the ethical implementation of artificial intelligence and related technologies in healthcare.

Luke is making additional contributions to several ongoing projects at the center, and he is one of our "go-to" people whenever someone has a question about statistics and data analysis. He hopes to continue contributing to healthcare research throughout his fellowship and beyond.


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## Project Spotlight

### Forward with Dementia

Forward with Dementia is a campaign that shares stories and suggestions from people living with dementia, family or friend care partners, and health and social care providers. The aim is to improve awareness of and access to supports following a diagnosis of dementia. Forward with Dementia is part of a large international research project called 'COGNISANCE' that is being conducted in Canada (including New Brunswick, Ontario, and Quebec), Australia, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom, and Poland. The NB team received funding through the Government of New Brunswick's Healthy Seniors Pilot Project.
