

All Ages, Child (0-17 years old) and Children Under Age 6 Poverty Rates, BC and Canada, CFLIM After Tax, 2016



Child Poverty Rates, by Province/Territory, CFLIM After Tax, 2016



SOME BC CHILDREN ARE OVER-REPRESENTED IN POVERTY STATISTICS





Child Poverty Rates, Canada and British Columbia, CFLIM After Tax, 2000-2016





Proportion of BC Children 0-17 in Couple Families and Lone-Parent Families, 2016






