Executive Summary

This report is the first in a series of annual updates on post-secondary graduates' retention in New Brunswick (NB) that will be released by the New Brunswick Institute for Research, Data and Training (NB-IRDT) each year. These reports provide an overview of NB graduates' retention patterns since the previous reporting period, and these periodic updates on graduates' retention trends can help guide public policy discussions around education and training strategies to attract youth to study, work, and live in NB.

The current study, which looks at 2019 and 2020 graduate cohorts, updates the graduate retention results published by Bhuiyan et al. (2021), which considered individuals who graduated as recently as 2018. However, two changes in methodology used in this report mean that results presented here are not directly comparable to the previous results (Bhuiyan et al., 2021).

- The first change is that in this report, the data on university graduates come from the Maritime Provinces Higher Education Commission (MPHEC), rather than the universities themselves. Though graduation numbers are very close between the two sources, data matching rates are lower with the new source.
- Second, a more conservative definition of retention is adopted in this report, whereby changes in Medicare status prior to an individual's graduation date are used to assess retention post-graduation.

These methodological changes are discussed in more detail below, but the net result is that estimated retention rates in this report are somewhat lower than comparable results in the previous report. We therefore present the full historical series of retention rates so that changes over time can be assessed using a consistent methodology.

Highlight of Findings

Matching Rates

The matching rate shows the proportion of graduates whose education data could be matched to Medicare records. Unmatched graduates are mostly students from other provinces who are not eligible for Medicare while studying; this group most likely includes students who came to NB to study but left the province soon after graduation. This unmatched group of students from other provinces is a vital component of overall graduate retention, along with students eligible for Medicare while studying (i.e., NB residents and students from outside Canada).

- The matching rates for graduates from publicly funded post-secondary universities increased in both 2019 and 2020 when compared to the rate in 2018.

- These increases can be attributed to a higher proportion of matched university graduates who are originally from outside Canada for the 2019 (74.8%) and 2020 (76.1%) cohorts compared to 2018 (69.2%). This increase also might have contributed to the increased retention rates of graduates.
- Note that the matching rate for graduates from outside Canada could be as high as that of graduates from NB since international students have been eligible for Medicare since 2017. However, some of these graduates may remain unmatched due to technical errors, such as missing or mismatched information (name, date of birth, and sex) resulting in the underestimation of the retention rates for graduates from outside Canada.
- The matching rates of publicly funded college graduates slightly increased in 2019 compared to the corresponding value in 2018 then dropped below 2018 levels in 2020.

Retention Rates

- The 1-year retention rates for 2019 and 2020 graduate cohorts continue to be higher for college graduates than for university graduates. Similarly, in the case of 3-year retention rates, college graduates exhibit higher rates than those of university graduates.
- The 1-year retention rates for female university and college graduates continue to be higher than those of male graduates for both 2019 and 2020 cohorts.
- Among university graduates who originally resided in NB, the highest 1-year retention rates for the 2020 cohort are for UNB graduates. However, the highest 3-year retention rates (2017 and 2018 cohorts) are for UdeM graduates.
- Among university graduates originally from outside Canada, UdeM (2020 cohort) has the highest 1-year retention rate. Both UdeM and STU have the highest 3-year retention rates for graduates from outside Canada for both 2017 and 2018 cohorts.
- STU exhibits the highest 1-year retention rate for university graduates from provinces outside NB (2020 cohort).
- CCNB graduates originally from NB have the highest 1-year retention (2020 cohort) and the highest 3-year (2017 and 2018 cohorts) retention rates among college graduates.
- University graduates from nursing programs have the highest 1-year retention rates for both 2019 and 2020 cohorts. Among college graduates, education and personal support graduates have the highest 1-year retention rates for 2019 and 2020 cohorts.
- UdeM graduates exhibit the highest 1-year retention rates among university graduates in 2019 and 2020, respectively. NBCC has the highest 1-year retention rates among college graduates in both 2019 and 2020.

Introduction

This report updates earlier work undertaken by the New Brunswick Institute for Research, Data and Training (NB-IRDT) on post-secondary graduates' retention in New Brunswick (NB) using more recently available data. The baseline report for this study is Bhuiyan et al. (2021), which uses matched administrative data from the NB university and college registrars and the Citizen Data holdings on NB-IRDT's secure platform.

The current study updates findings by Bhuiyan et al. (2021) by adding two additional years of data (2019 and 2020) to the analysis, as well as by using university graduate data from the Maritime Provinces Higher Education Commission (MPHEC) rather than from the universities themselves. This report also uses a longer range of graduation data from the publicly funded community colleges.

Data and Methodology

Data

This report considers the retention of graduates from the same universities and colleges as included in Bhuiyan et al. (2021). However, we use university graduate data from the MPHEC, which combines the four universities¹ into one data source, rather than using the university data sources individually, as was done in Bhuiyan et al. (2021).

We note two main changes between this report and Bhuiyan et al. (2021). One is that the MPHEC data do not include students from UNB's Humber College in Ontario, unlike the UNB data used in Bhuiyan et al. (2021). The other is that there are no "Unknown" sex records in the MPHEC data, whereas Bhuiyan et al. (2021) did include some graduates with "Unknown" sex records.

The NBCC, CCNB, and NBCCD data sets used in this report come directly from those colleges, which is similar to Bhuiyan et al. (2021). However, the data sources in this report have an expanded data range compared to those in Bhuiyan et al. (2021), as shown in Table 1. Our analysis only includes years for which the educational institutions collected 12 full months (one calendar year) of data.

¹ The four universities are Mount Allison University (MTA), St. Thomas University (STU), Université de Moncton (UdeM), and the University of New Brunswick (UNB).

We also use NB-IRDT's Citizen Data holdings, which are used and described in Bhuiyan et al. (2021). However, we expand the data range in this report to include registered residents up to December 31, 2021.

Methodology

This report uses much of the same methodology as Bhuiyan et al. (2021).

Like Bhuiyan et al. (2021), this report assumes that an individual's NB Medicare status identifies whether they remained in the province and the duration of their stay in NB. A graduate's departure from the province is determined by the date of termination of their active Medicare status in the Citizen Data.² "Matched" individuals (i.e., graduates with Medicare information) are considered to be retained if they have an Active Medicare Registration in NB 1 year, 3 years, 5 years, or 10 years after the date of graduation – otherwise, they are considered to have left the province on or prior to the date of termination of an active Medicare status. "Unmatched" individuals (i.e., graduates with no Medicare information) are also assumed to have left the province.

To the extent that our methodologies differ from those of Bhuiyan et al. (2021), we describe those changes here. While individuals are "Matched" or "Unmatched" using the same methodology as Bhuiyan et al. (2021), the match rates for university students are slightly lower when MPHEC data are used in this report.

We calculate retention, or "retained" individuals, using the methodology specified in Bhuiyan et al. (2021) with one change. In that report, individuals were considered to have left NB if there

² Persons living in NB are extremely likely to have registered with NB Medicare, as this government program covers the cost of many medical expenses. Therefore, we assume that individuals residing in NB will appear in the Medicare registry (i.e., Citizen Data).

was a termination in Medicare registration after the individual's graduation date. In the current report, active Medicare status after graduation is used to determine retention, and if that is not present, the individual is assumed to have left NB.

For most of the data, this change has no effect, but there is one group whose status changes because of the change in methodology – specifically, the relatively small number of individuals whose Medicare status terminates prior to their date of graduation.

Since it is likely that these individuals departed the province prior to their official graduation date (and either returned to graduate or graduated *in absentia*), they are more appropriately treated as departures from NB. The net effect of both changes is a small reduction in retention rates compared to what was reported in Bhuiyan et al. (2021).

We thus present the full historical series of retention rates so that changes over time can be assessed using a consistent methodology. The counts and rates are in calendar year for all graduating cohorts.

Counts presented throughout this report are randomly rounded to base 5 to protect confidentiality of small sample sizes.

Results

Total

Counts with Matching Rates

The matching rates for individuals who graduated from publicly funded post-secondary universities in both 2019 and 2020 (77.0% and 77.6%) are marginally higher than the corresponding value in 2018 (76.6%), as shown in Table 2.

In contrast, the matching rates for publicly funded college graduates increased slightly in 2019 (94.5%) compared to 2018 (93.5%) before falling to 92.9% in 2020, as shown in Table 3.

Table 4 exhibits the matching rates disaggregated by the previous residence of university and college graduates (i.e., residence before enrollment). The results indicate a notable increase (by approximately 5 percentage points) in matching rates for university graduates who are originally from outside Canada for both 2019 and 2020 cohorts compared to 2018. This increase contributes to the overall rise of university matching rates in 2019 and 2020.

In the case of college graduates, the matching rates for graduates from outside Canada are also higher for the 2019 and 2020 cohorts compared to previous cohorts. The variability in matching rates for graduates who are originally from outside NB is due to small counts.

Note that the jump in the matching rates for both university and college graduates from outside Canada can be attributed to the issuance of Medicare to international students from 2017 onwards. However, the matching rate for graduates from outside Canada is not as high as that of graduates from NB even though these students are eligible for provincial Medicare. This may be due to some students not switching to Medicare and/or relying on a campus health clinic, and then leaving the province shortly after graduation. However, other graduates may be unmatched because of technical errors, such as missing information or information that is not reported consistently across both datasets (name, date of birth, and sex) even though they are

actually residing in NB after graduation. This may result in an underestimation of the retention rates for graduates from outside Canada.³

It is also to be noted that a large majority of unmatched individuals are Canadian students from other provinces who are not eligible for NB Medicare while enrolled, and many return to their province of origin after graduation.

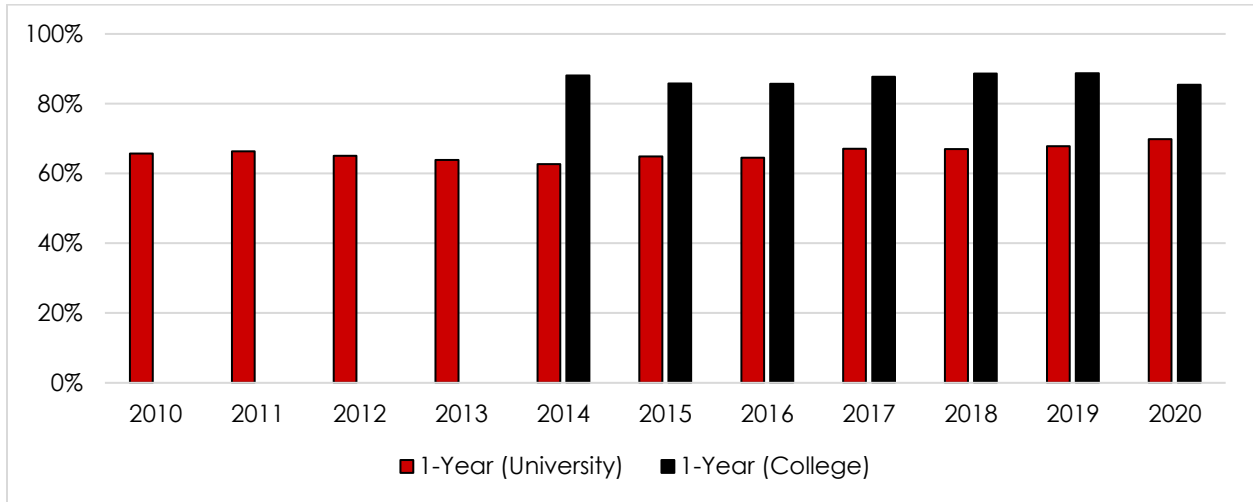
1-Year Retention Rates

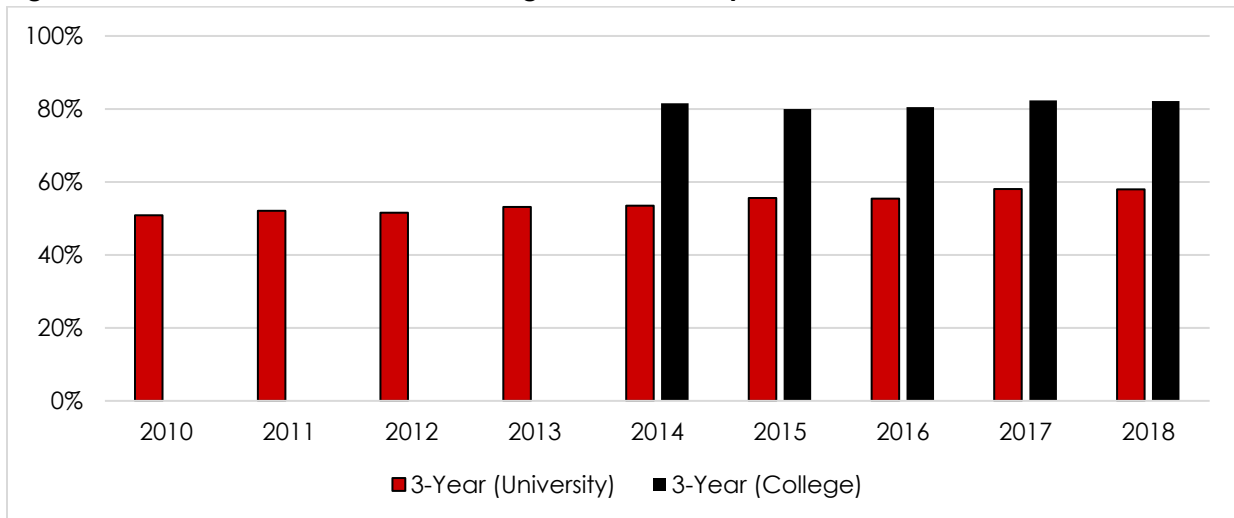
Figure 1: 1-Year Retention Rates of College and University Graduates

The 1-year retention rate for university graduates increased by almost 2 percentage points for the 2020 graduating cohort compared to the corresponding figure in 2019, which is also slightly higher than the retention rate in 2018 (67.0%), as shown in Figure 1.

The retention rates for college students graduating in 2019 and 2020 continue to be higher than those of university graduates in the same years. The 1-year retention rate for 2019 college graduates (91.1%) rose slightly compared to the 2018 cohort (90.0%) but declined for the 2020 cohort (88.3%), as shown in Figure 1. [Table 13](#) and [Table 14](#) in the Appendix show the corresponding data.

³ For example, the matching rates for CCNB graduates who are originally from outside Canada is about 6-8 percentage points lower than those of NBCC. This difference in the matching rates may contribute to the lower retention rates for CCNB graduates from outside Canada as opposed to NBCC graduates.

3-Year Retention Rates

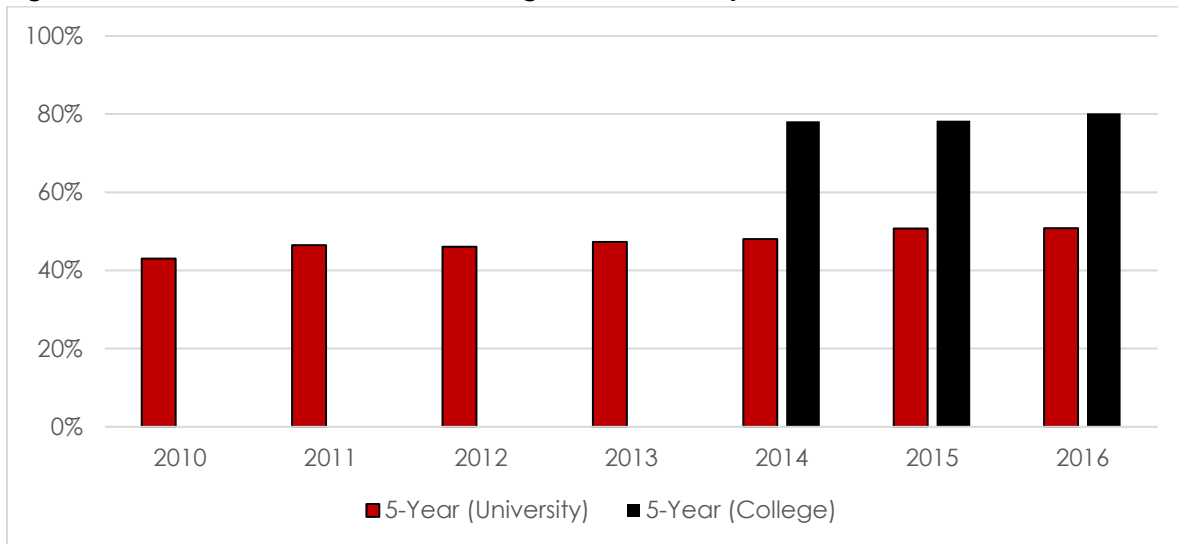
Figure 2: 3-Year Retention Rates of College and University Graduates

3-year retention rates for college graduates continue to be higher than those of university graduates in the 2018 cohort. For both college and university graduates, the 3-year retention rates were virtually unchanged for 2018 cohort when compared to 2017, as shown in Figure 2.

5-Year Retention Rates

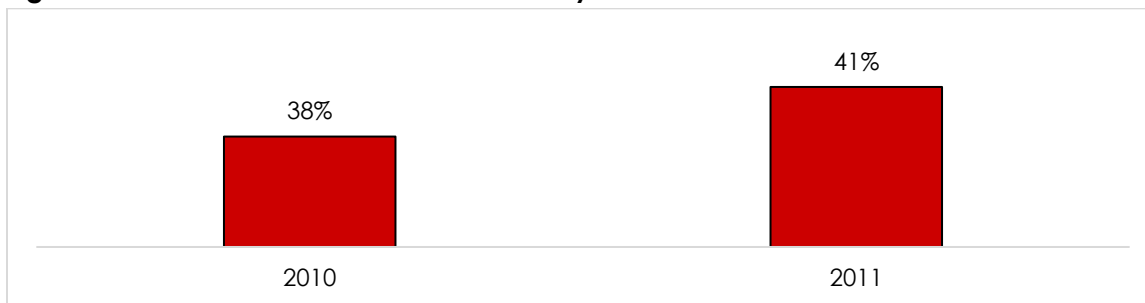
Figure 3: 5-Year Retention Rates of College and University Graduates

The 5-year retention rate for university graduates from the 2016 cohort is almost unchanged compared to 2015. For college graduates, the 5-year retention rate for the 2016 cohort increased by 2 percentage point compared to 2015, as shown in Figure 3.

10-Year Retention Rates

The 10-year retention rate for university graduates rose to approximately 3 percentage points for the 2011 cohort when compared with 2010, as shown in Figure 4.

Figure 4: 10-Year Retention Rates of University Graduates



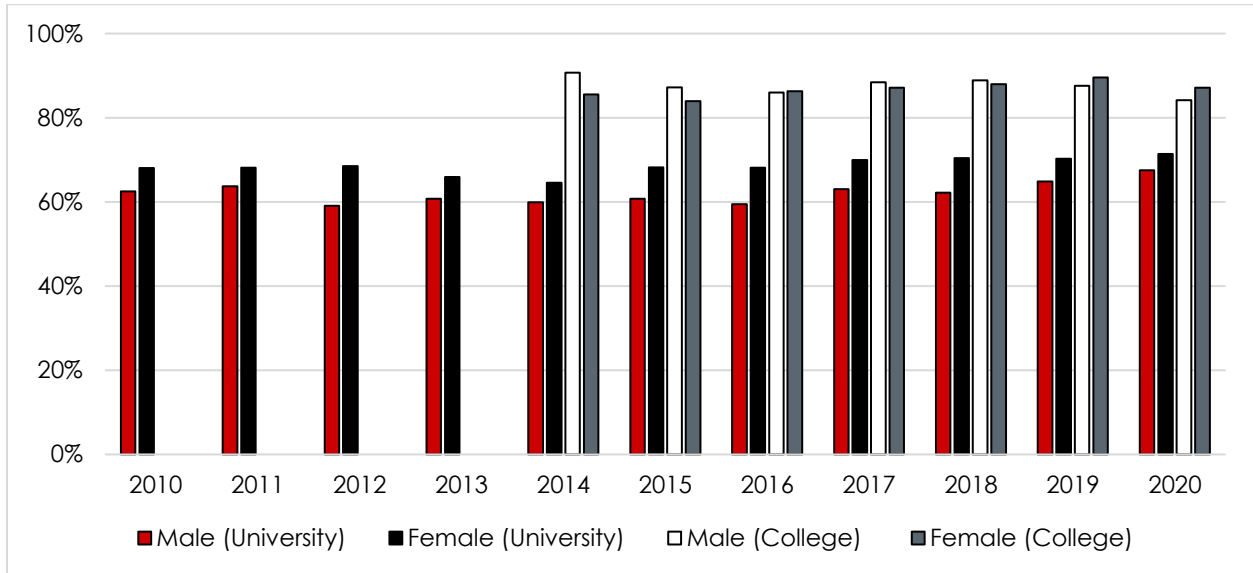
By Sex

1-Year Retention Rates

The 1-year retention rates for female university graduates continue to be higher than those of male university graduates for both 2020 and 2019 cohorts.

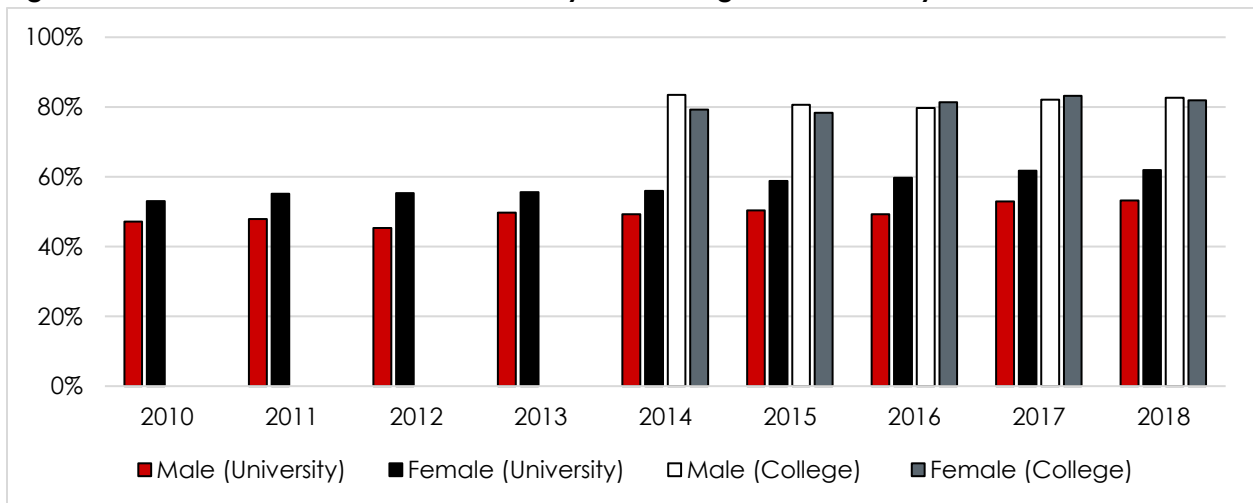
Figure 5: 1-Year Retention Rates of University and College Graduates by Sex

The 1-year retention rates for male university graduates rose for both 2019 (64.8%) and 2020 (67.5%) cohorts when compared with those graduating in 2018 (62.2%). On the other hand, the 1-year retention rate for female college graduates remained stable for both 2019 (70.2%) and 2020 cohorts (71.4%) when compared with 2018 (70.4%), as shown in Figure 5. 3-Year Retention Rates

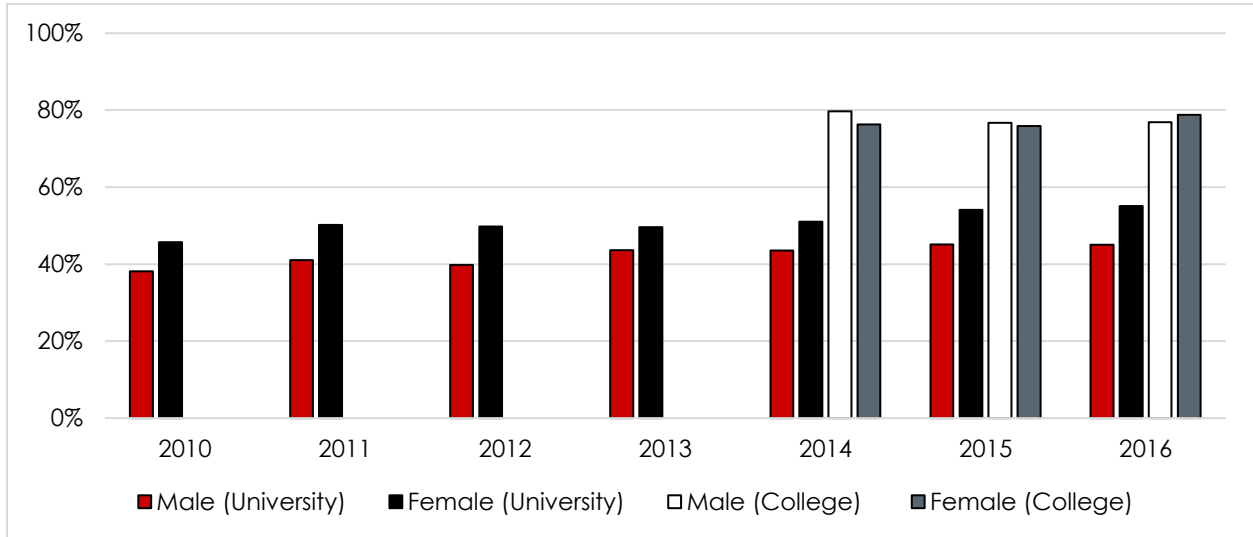
Figure 6: 3- Year Retention Rates of University and College Graduates by Sex

There was no noticeable change in the 3-year retention rates by sex between the 2018 and 2017 cohorts, as shown in Figure 6. [Table 16](#) in the Appendix shows the corresponding data.

5-Year Retention Rates

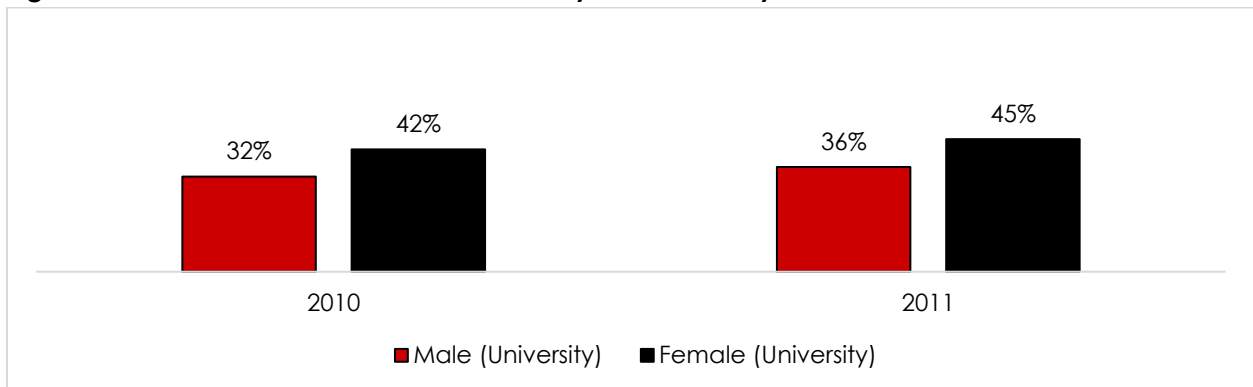
Figure 7: 5-Year Retention Rates of University and College Graduates by Sex

An increase of 3 percentage points in the 3-year retention rate of female college graduates was observed in the 2016 cohort when compared to the 2015 cohort, as shown in Figure 7. [Table 17](#) in the Appendix shows the corresponding data.

10-Year Retention Rates

The 10-year retention rates rose for both males and females in the 2011 cohort compared to 2010 by 4 and 3 percentage points, respectively, as shown in Figure 8. [Table 18](#) in the Appendix shows the corresponding data.

Figure 8: 10-Year Retention Rates of University Graduates by Sex

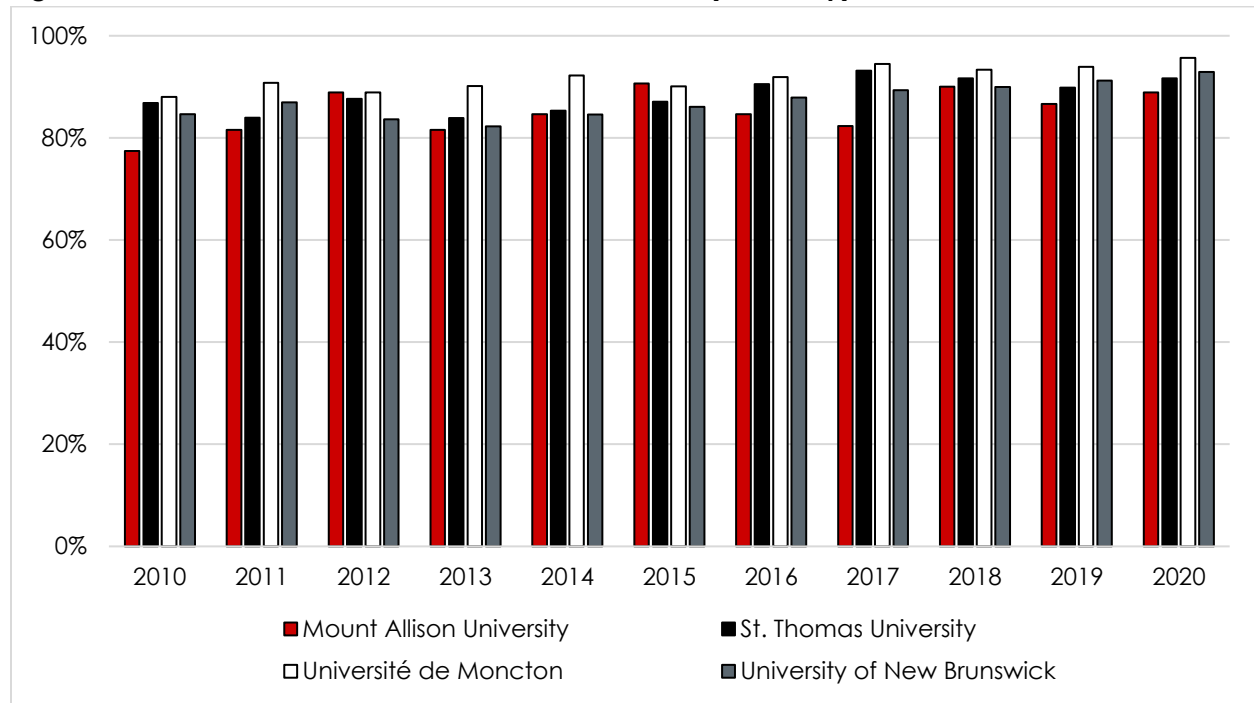


By Previous Residence

1-Year Retention Rates – University

The highest 1-year retention rates in 2020 for graduates who resided in NB prior to enrollment are for UdeM graduates (95.7%), followed by UNB graduates (92.9%) and STU graduates (91.7%). The retention rates for these two groups increased by 1.7 and 1.8 percentage points, respectively, compared to 2019, as shown in Figure 9, but results across universities are mixed with respect to the 2018 cohort. [Table 19](#) in the Appendix has the corresponding data, and [Table 22](#) shows the aggregated rates (university and college) by previous residence.

Figure 9: 1-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from NB (University)

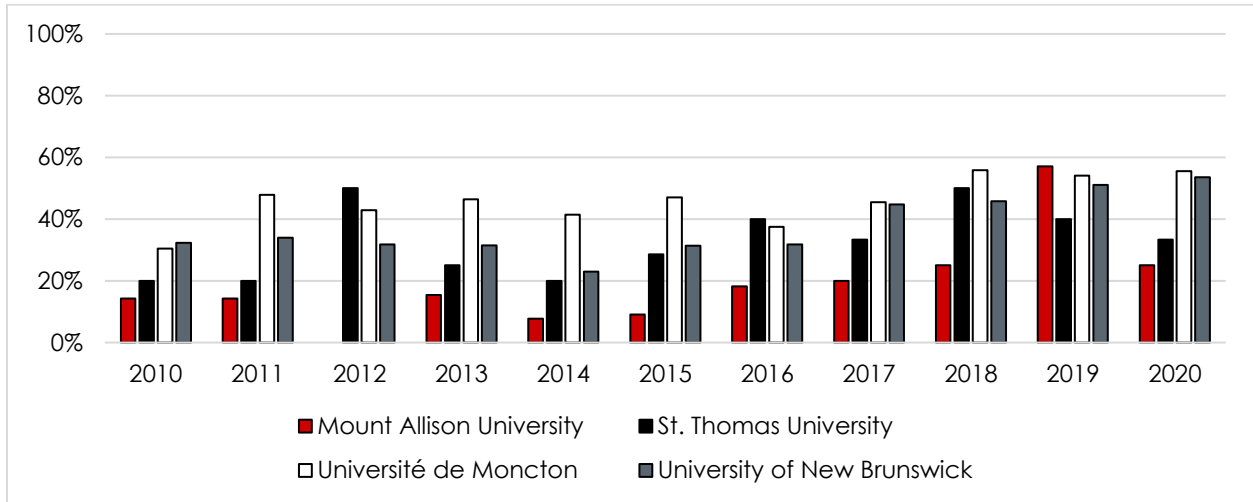

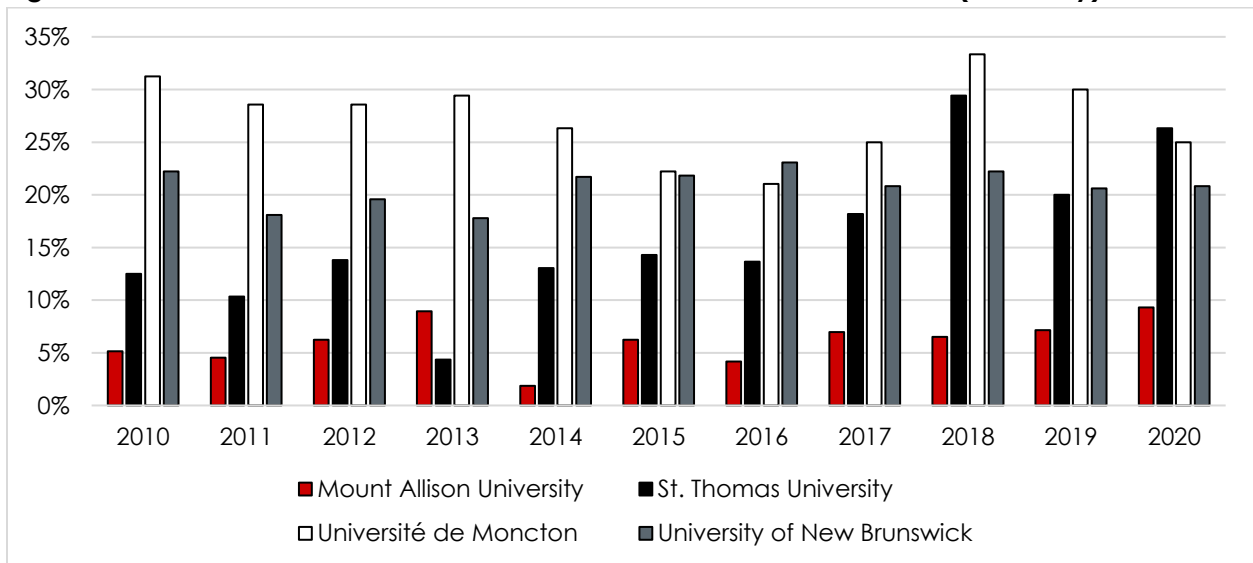
Figure 10: 1-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from Outside Canada (University)

For university graduates who were residents outside Canada prior to enrollment, the highest 1-year retention rate (55.6%) of the 2020 cohort was for those graduating from UdeM, followed by those graduating from UNB (53.6%), with the two groups showing an increase in 1-year retention rate from 2019, as shown Figure 10.

The increase in retention rates for UNB graduates is notably higher in 2020 and 2019 than in previous cohorts.

Note that small underlying sample sizes for the other universities lead to increased variability in retention rates for those universities over time. [Table 20](#) in the Appendix has the corresponding data.

For graduates who were resident in other provinces prior to post-secondary enrollment, STU graduates had the highest 1-year retention rate (26.3%) for the 2020 cohort. UdeM graduates from other provinces had the highest 1-year retention rate (30.0%) in 2019, as shown in Figure 11.

Figure 11: 1-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from Provinces Outside NB (University)

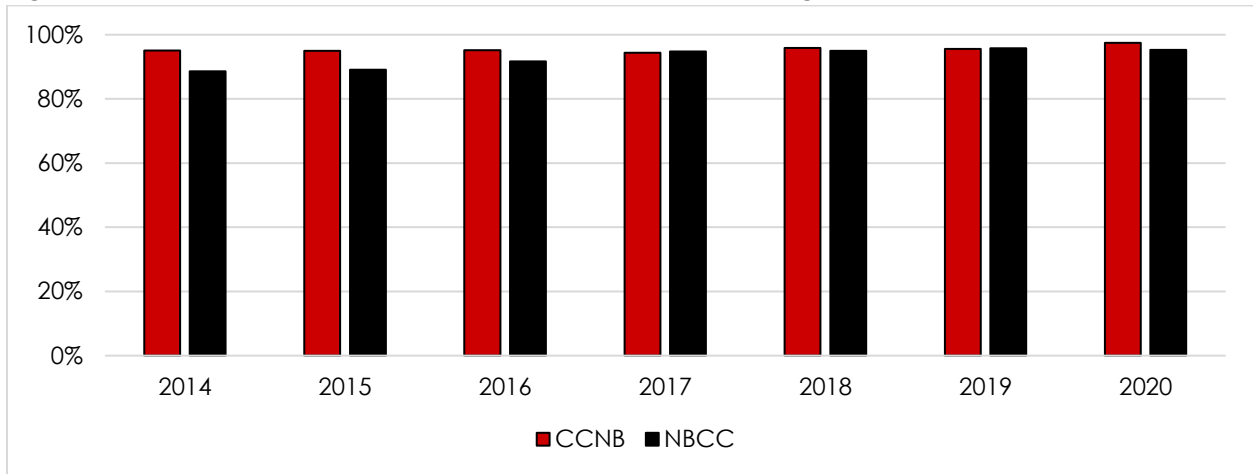


1-Year Retention Rates - College

The 2020 cohort of CCNB college graduates originally residing in NB had a 97.5% retention rate with a 1.9 percentage points increase from 2019, as shown in Figure 12. Corresponding figures for NBCC graduates are marginally lower and have been steady over time. [Table 19](#) in the

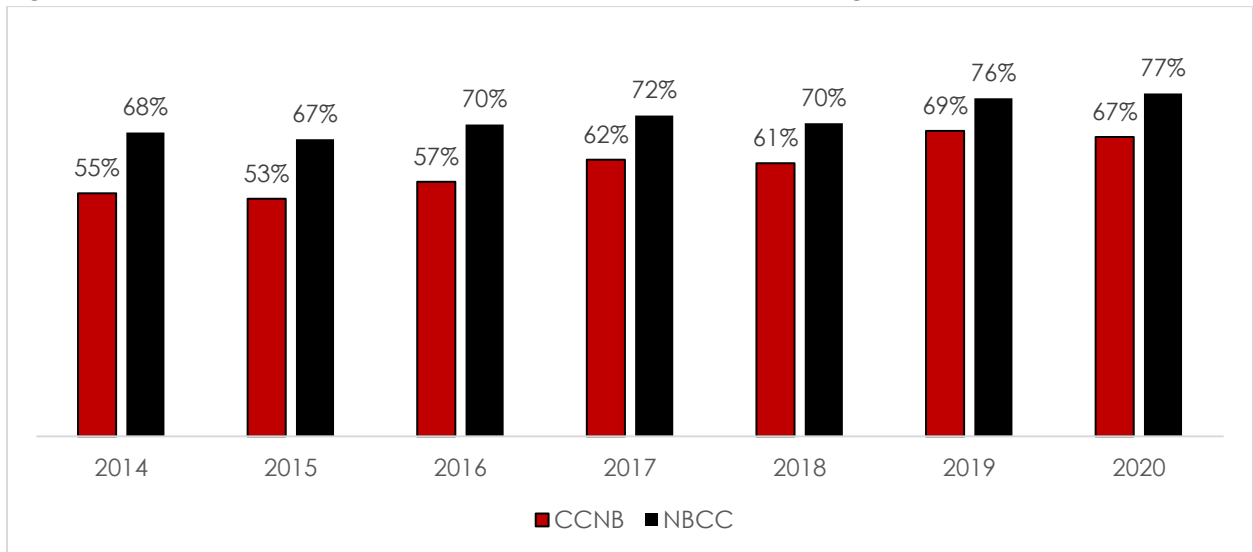

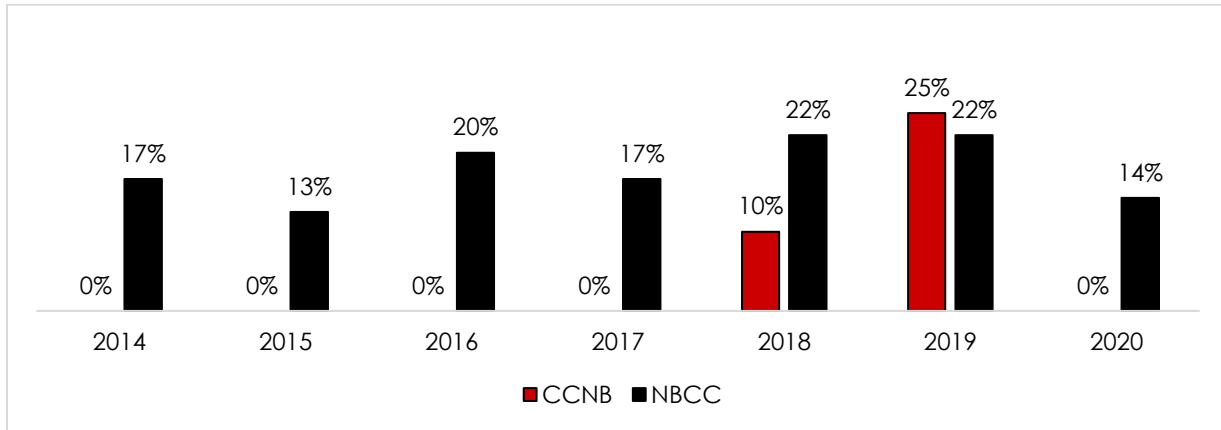
Figure 13: 1-Year Rates of Graduates from Outside Canada (College)

Among college graduates from outside Canada, NBCC's 2020 cohort had the highest 1-year retention rate (77.0%), as shown in Figure 13. Note that the difference in retention rates might be partially affected by the difference in the matching rates of graduates from outside Canada.⁴ [Table 20](#) in the Appendix shows the corresponding data.

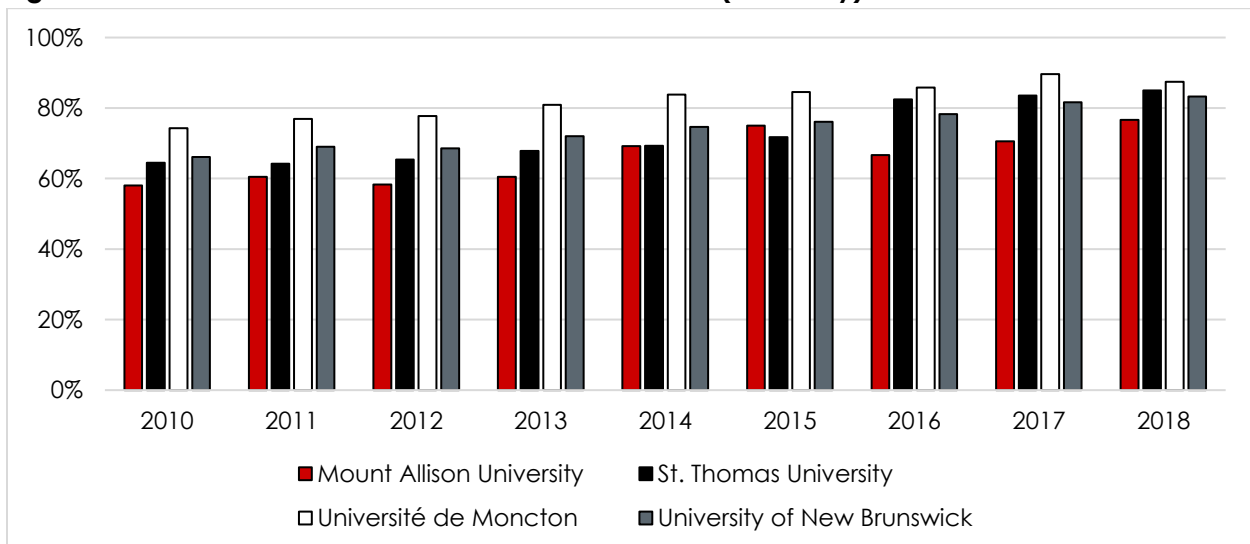
Figure 14: 1-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from Provinces Outside NB (College)

Figure 14 shows that no CCNB graduates from provinces outside NB were retained after 1 year, apart from the 2018 (10.0%) and 2019 (25.0%) cohorts. [Table 21](#) in the Appendix shows the corresponding data. It should be noted that underlying case counts are typically quite small.

3-Year Retention Rates - University

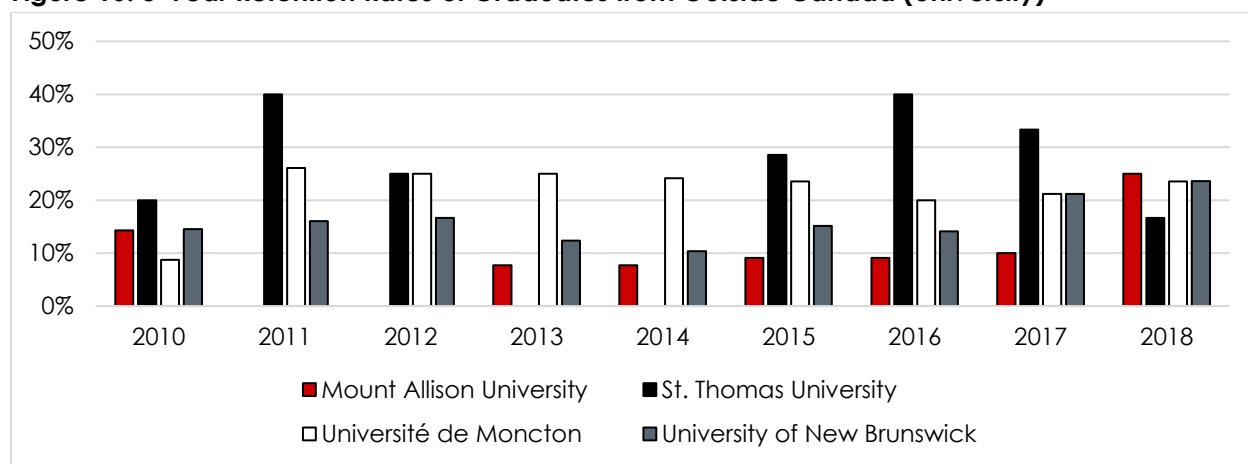
Figure 15: 3-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from NB (University)

UdeM graduates who were resident in NB prior to enrollment had the highest 3-year retention rates among NB universities in both 2017 (89.7%) and 2018 (87.4%) cohorts. MTA graduates' 3-year retention rate rose 6.1 percentage points in 2018 (76.7%) when compared with 2017 (70.6%), as shown in Figure 15. UdeM and STU had the highest 3-year retention rates for graduates originally from outside Canada for both 2017 and 2018 cohorts. UNB graduates showed a rising trend across graduate

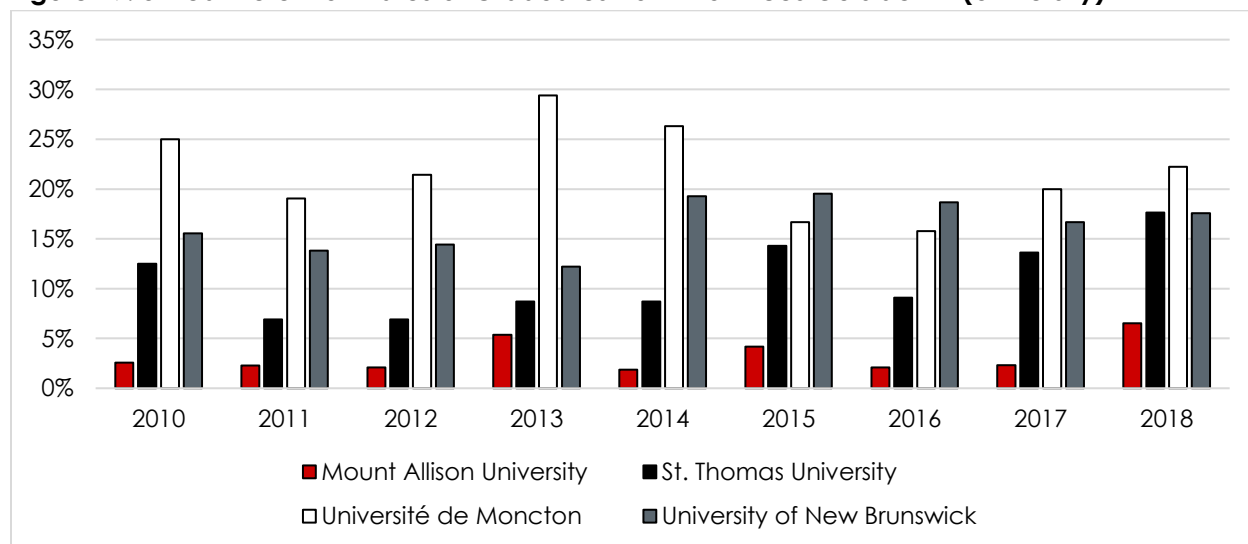
cohorts in 3-year retention rates, as illustrated in Figure 16. [Table 24](#) in the Appendix shows the corresponding data.

Udem, followed by STU, had the highest 3-year retention rates for university graduates residing in provinces outside NB prior to registration in both 2017 and 2018 cohorts, with a rising trend between 2016-2018 cohorts, as shown in Figure 17. Figure 17: 3-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from Provinces Outside NB (University)

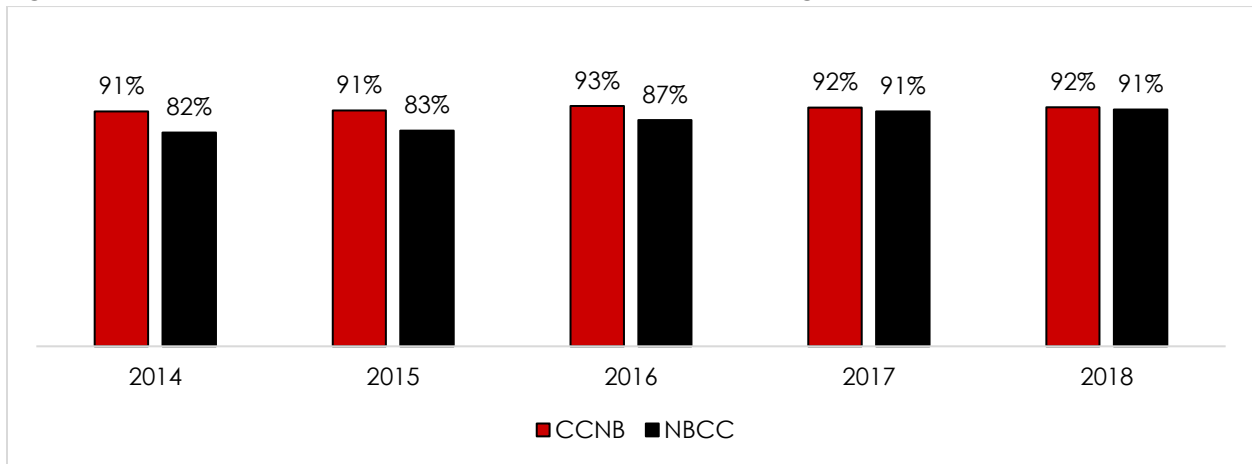


3-Year Retention Rates – College

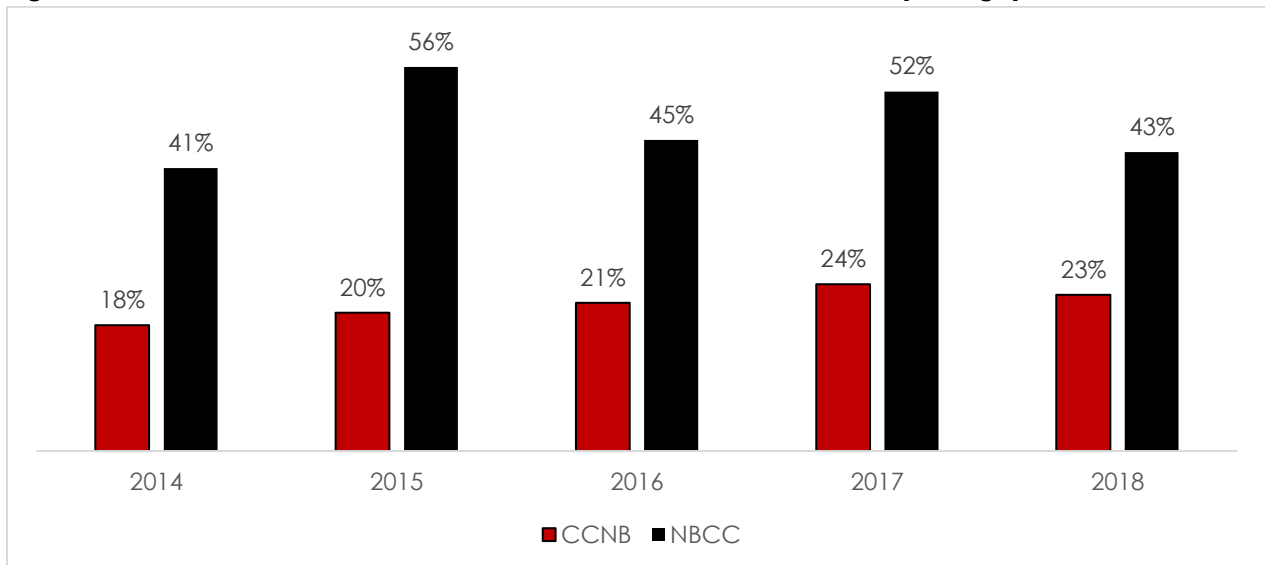
Figure 18: 3-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from NB (College)

CCNB graduates originally resident in NB had the highest 3-year retention rates for both 2017 (92.1%) and 2018 (92.2%) cohorts. The 3-year retention rates for NBCC graduates increased for both 2018 and 2017 cohorts when compared with 2016, as shown in Figure 18. [Table 23](#) in the

In 2018, NBCC had the highest 3-year retention rate for graduates from outside Canada (43.2%). The 3-year retention rate for CCNB graduates was 22.6%, as shown in Figure 19. [Table 24](#) in the Appendix shows the corresponding data. Figures not reported have been suppressed because of small sample counts.

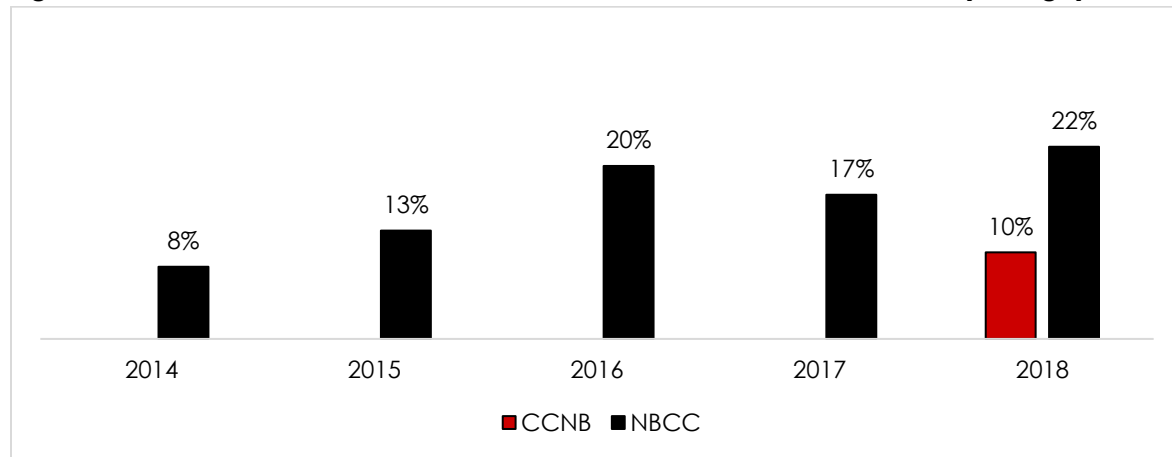
Note that the matching rates for CCNB graduates who are originally from outside Canada is about 6-8 percentage points lower than those of NBCC graduates. This difference in the matching rates has likely contributed to the lower retention rates of CCNB graduates from outside Canada compared to retention rates of NBCC graduates.

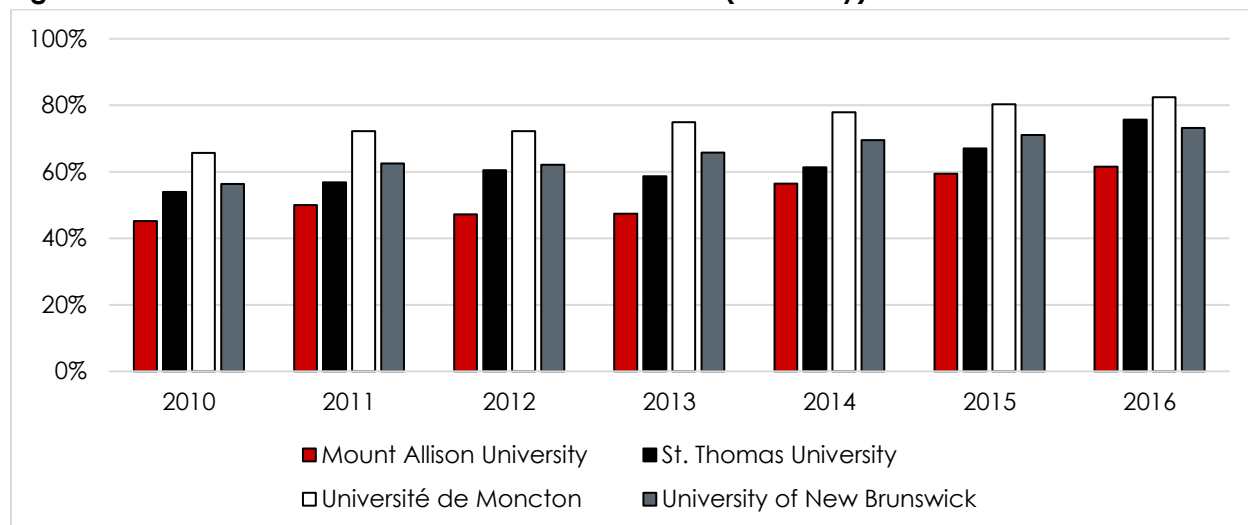
Figure 20: 3-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from Provinces Outside NB (College)

For college graduates from a province outside NB, NBCC had the highest 3-year retention rate (22.2%) for the 2018 cohort, as shown in Figure 20. [Table 25](#) in the Appendix shows the corresponding data. Figures not reported have been suppressed due to small sample counts.

5-Year Retention Rates – University

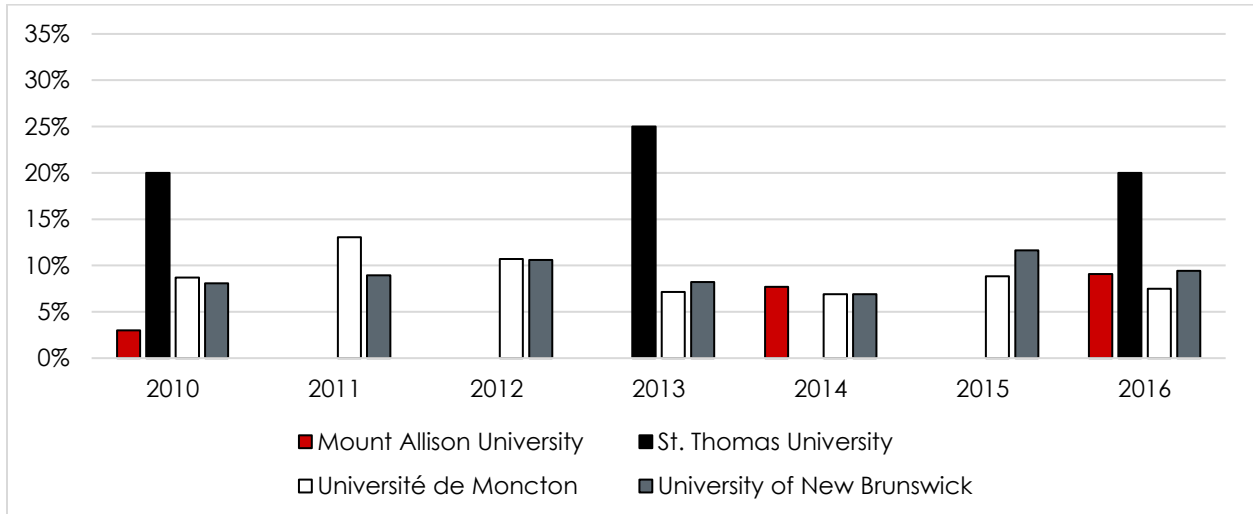
Among graduates who were resident in NB prior to enrollment, UdeM had the highest 5-year retention rate (82.4%) in 2016, with a 2.1 percentage points increase from the 2015 cohort, as shown in Figure 21. STU had an 8.6 percentage points increase in its 5-year retention rate between 2015 and 2016 graduating cohorts. This is the largest increase in 5-year retention rate among university graduates originally residing in NB. Figure 21: 5-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from NB (University)



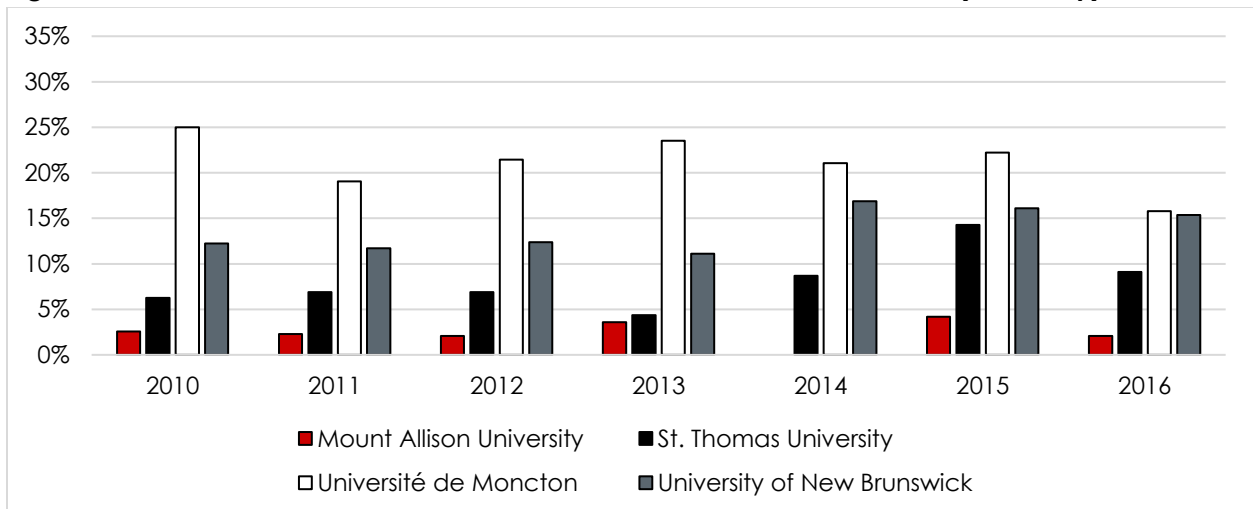
Among university graduates originally from outside Canada, the highest 5-year retention rate for 2016 cohorts is for STU (20.0%), as shown in Figure 22; though, small sample counts result in substantial variation in rates across cohorts.

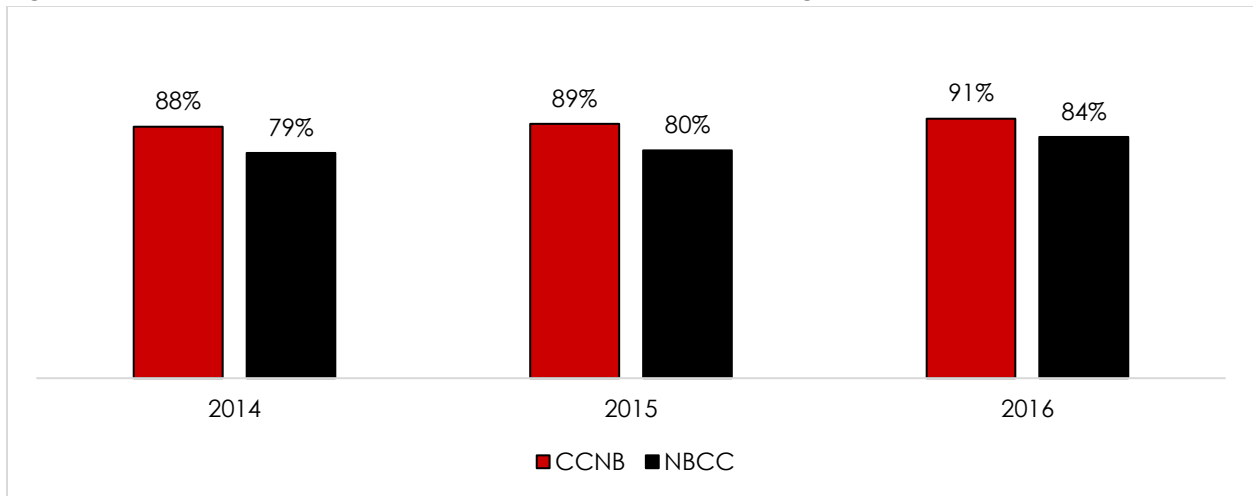
Figure 23: 5-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from Provinces Outside NB (University)

UdeM and UNB graduates from outside NB have the highest 5-year retention rates for 2016 and 2015 cohorts. Meanwhile, the 5-year retention rate for UdeM graduates cohort from outside NB fell by 6.4 percentage points in 2016. The retention rate for STU graduates from outside NB also dropped by 5.2 percentage points in 2016, as shown in Figure 23. [Table 29](#) in the Appendix shows the corresponding data.

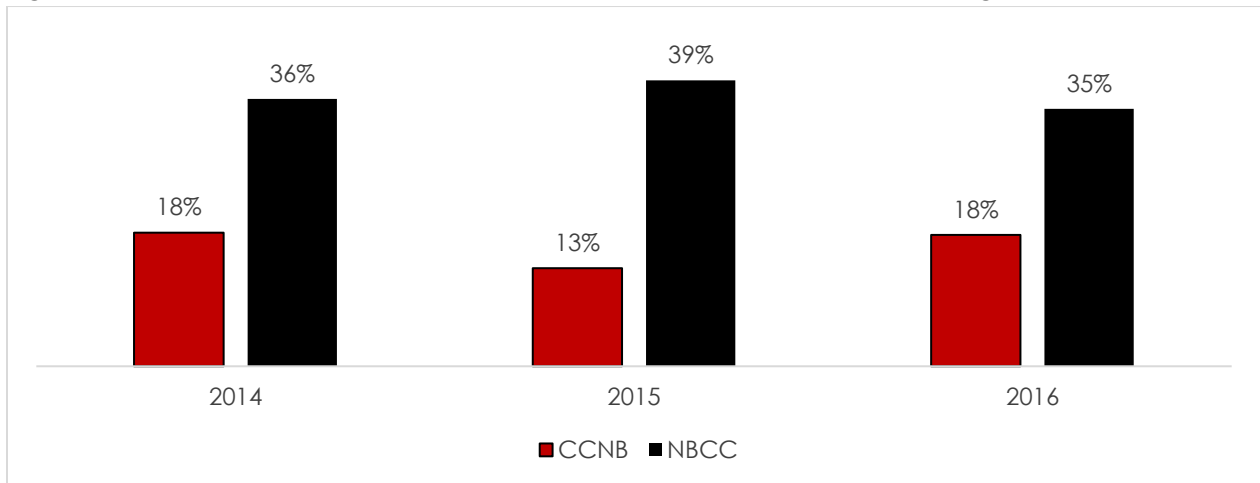

Figure 24: 5-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from NB (College)



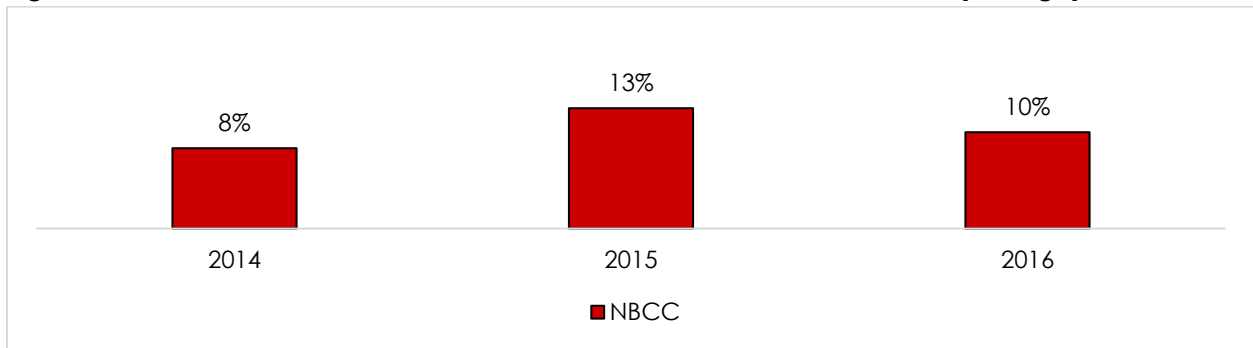
The 5-year retention rate for NBCC graduates from outside Canada dropped for the 2016 cohort by 3.9 percentage points, as shown in Figure 25. [Table 28](#) in the Appendix shows the corresponding data.

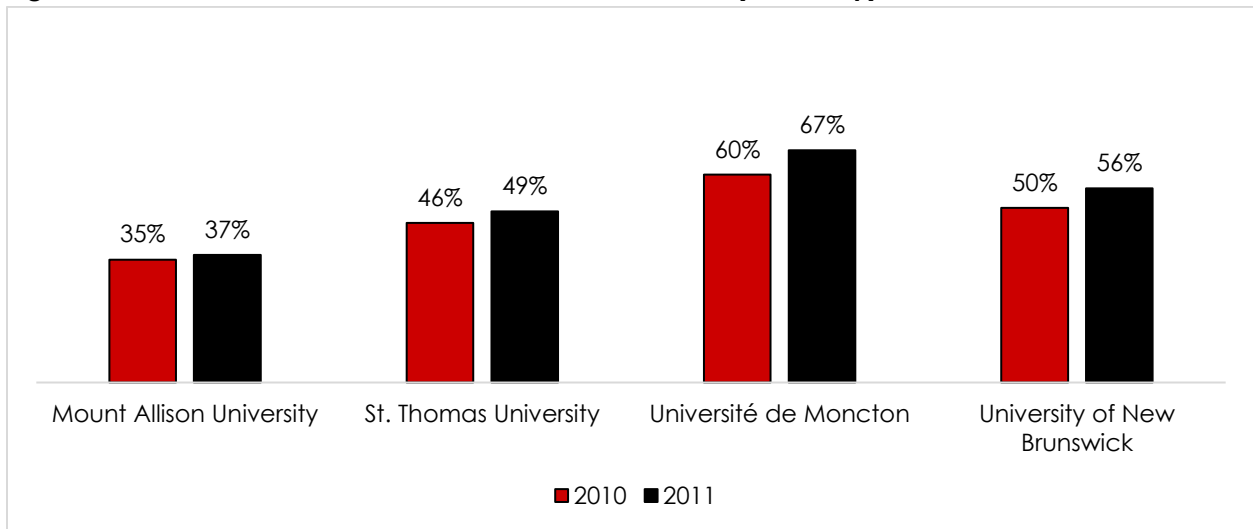
Figure 26: 5-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from Provinces Outside NB (College)



10-Year Retention Rates – University

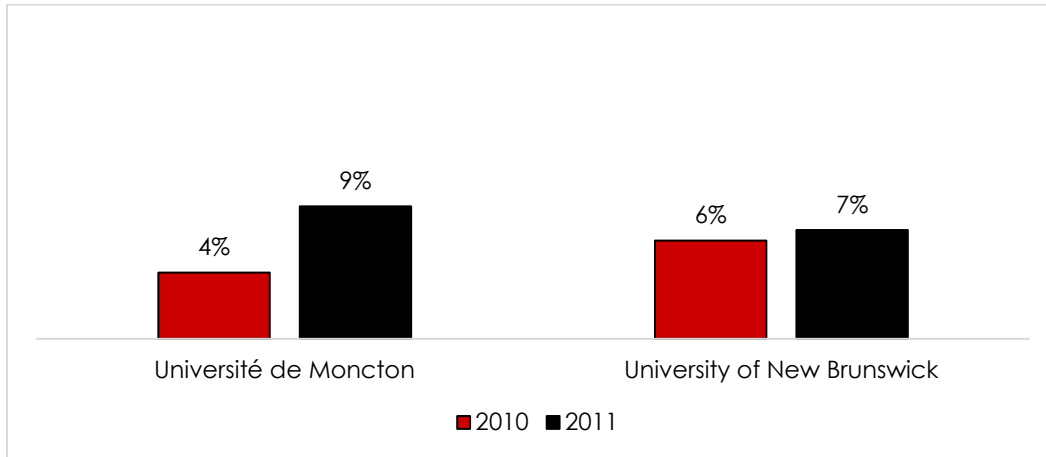
UdeM graduates from NB continued to have the highest 10-year retention rate for the 2011 cohort (67.1%), followed by UNB graduates (56.0%), with both showing a rising trend in Figure 27. Figure 27: 10-Year Retention Rates of Graduates from NB (University)



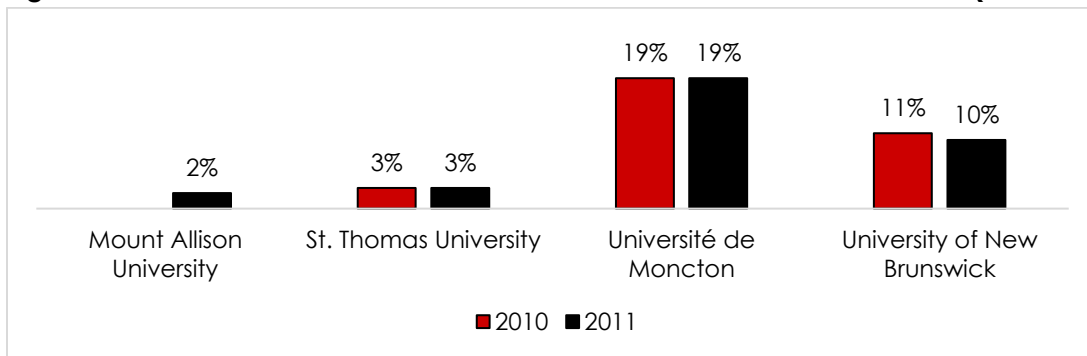
Among graduates who were originally from outside Canada, UdeM graduates had the highest 10-year retention rate of 8.7%, as shown in Figure 28. After 10 years, no graduates (from outside Canada) from either STU or MTA were retained in the province. [Table 32](#) in the Appendix shows the corresponding data. Figures not reported have been suppressed because of small sample counts.

5-Year Retention Rates – College

For 2016 college cohorts, nursing graduates had the highest 5-year retention rate (84.4%), with an increase of 8.1 percentage points from the corresponding value in 2015. 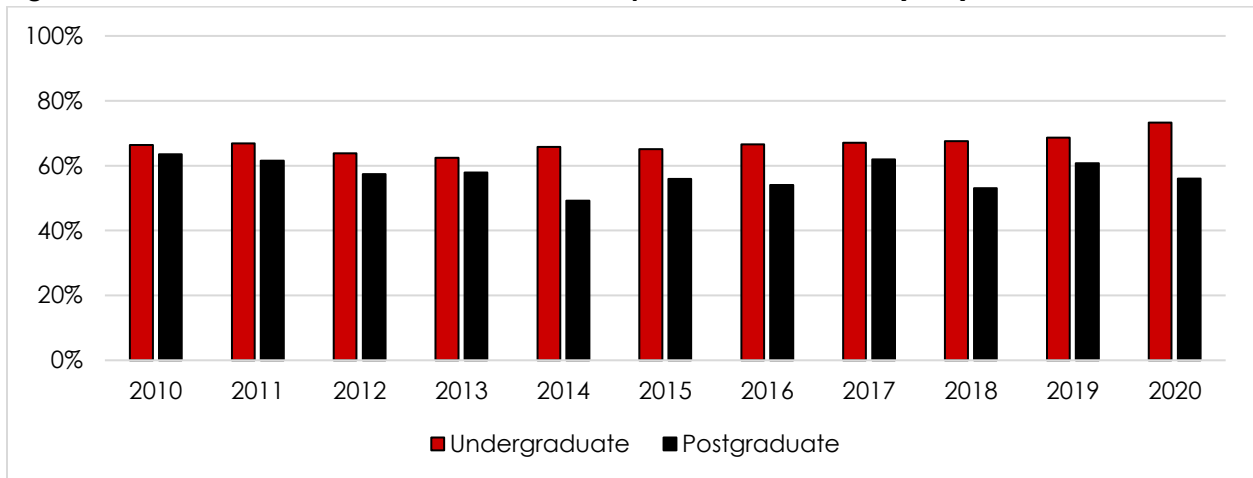

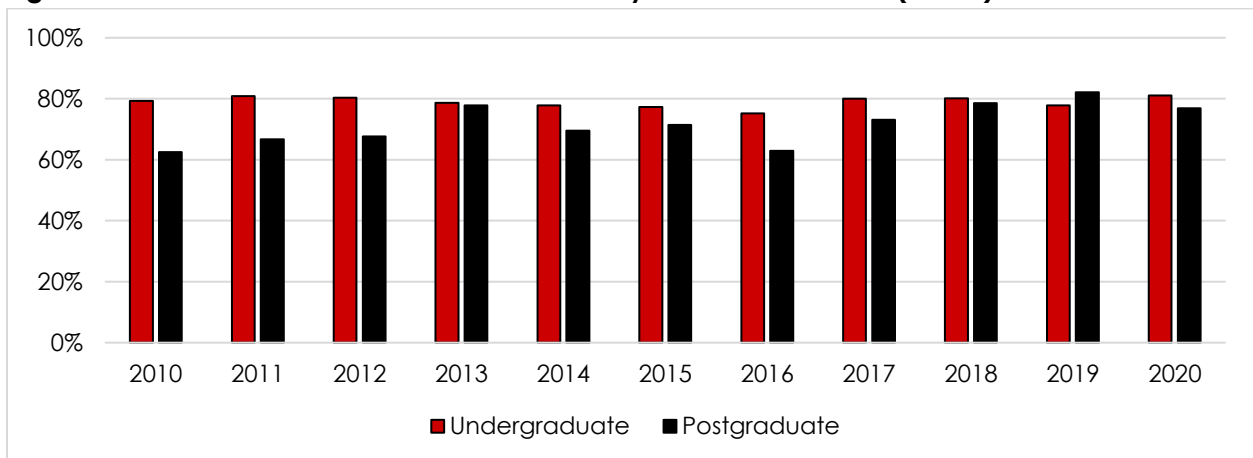

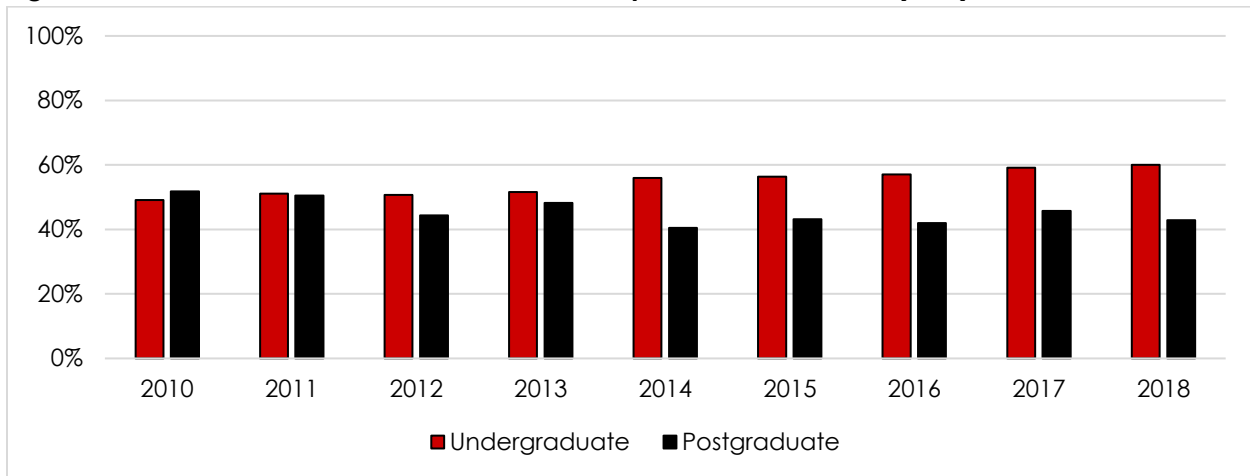
Figure 31: 1-Year Retention Rates of Graduates by Level of Education (UdeM)

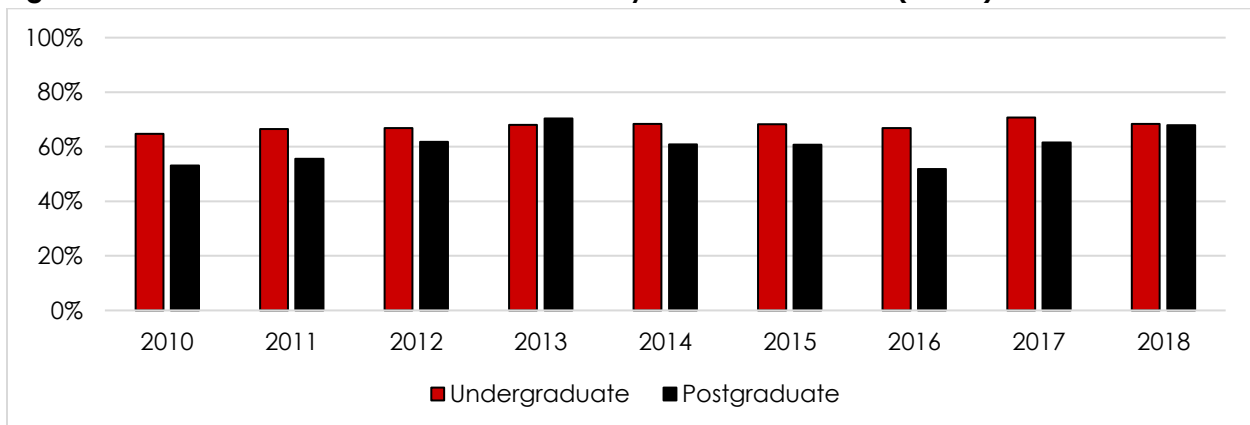

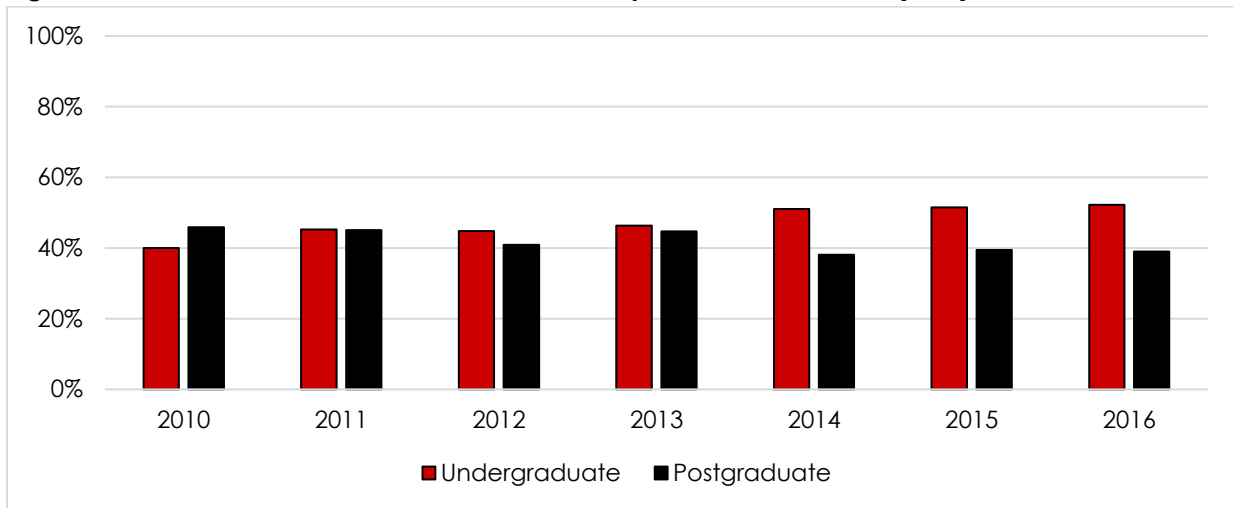
Figure 33: 3-Year Retention Rates of Graduates by Level of Education (UdeM)

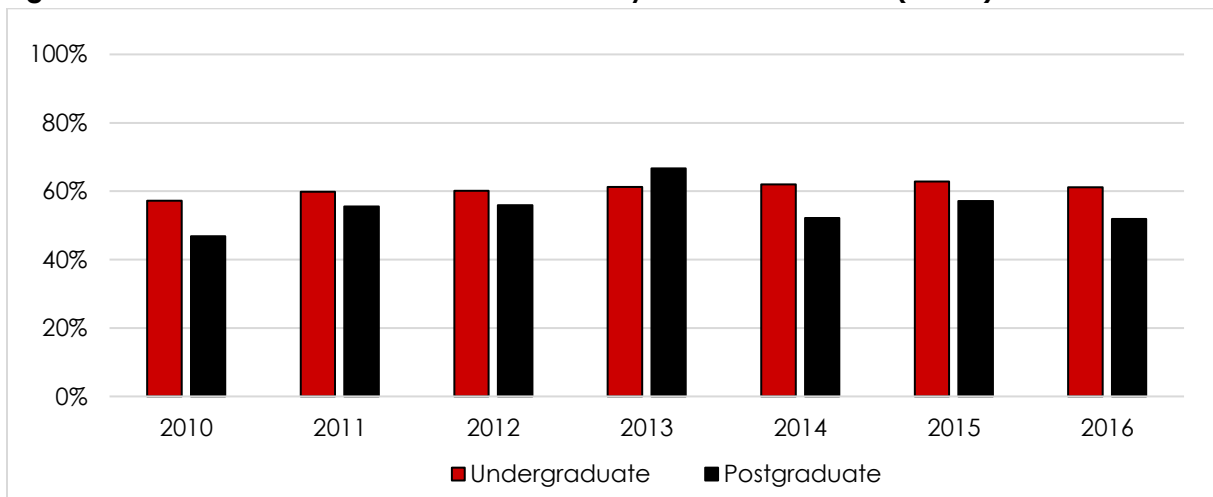

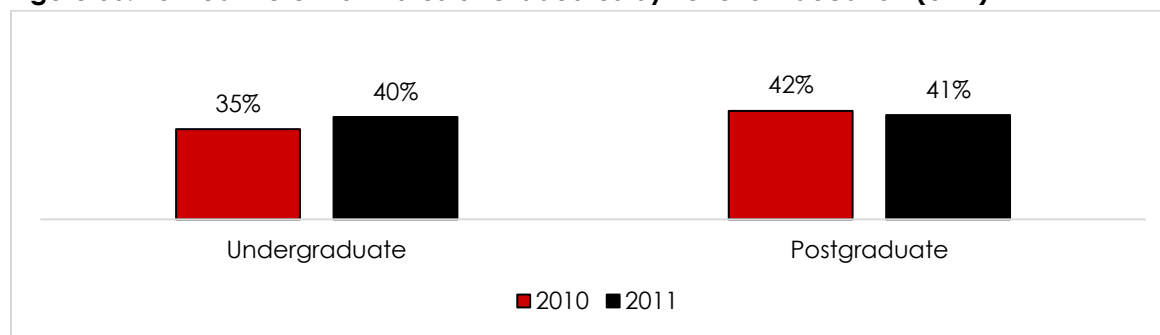
Figure 35: 5-Year Retention Rates of Graduates by Level of Education (UdeM)

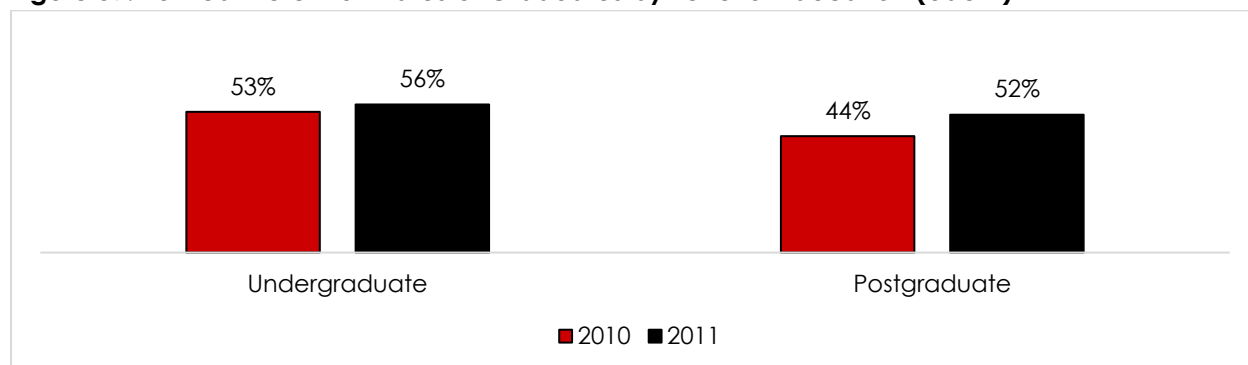

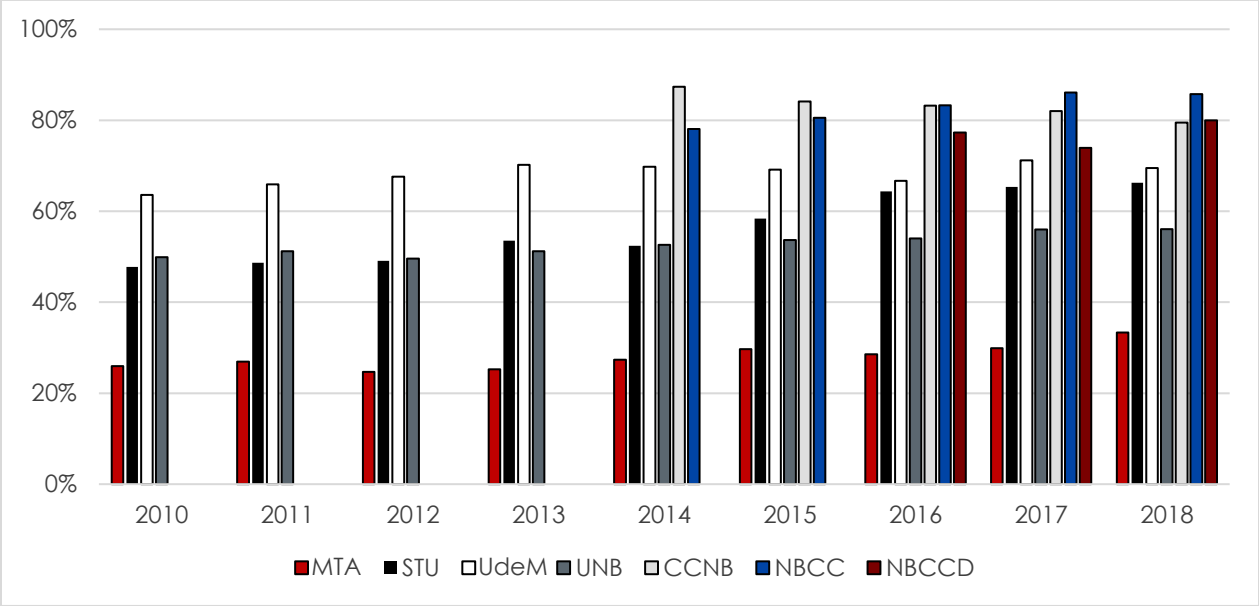

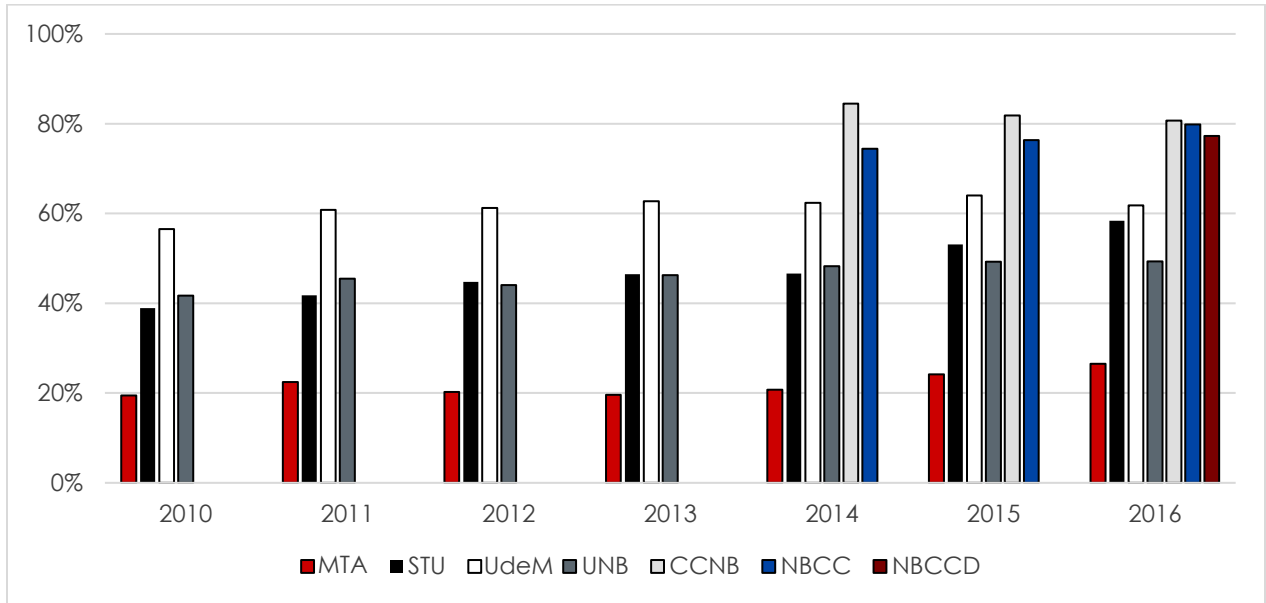
Figure 38: 3-Year Retention Rates of University and College Graduates by Educational Institution

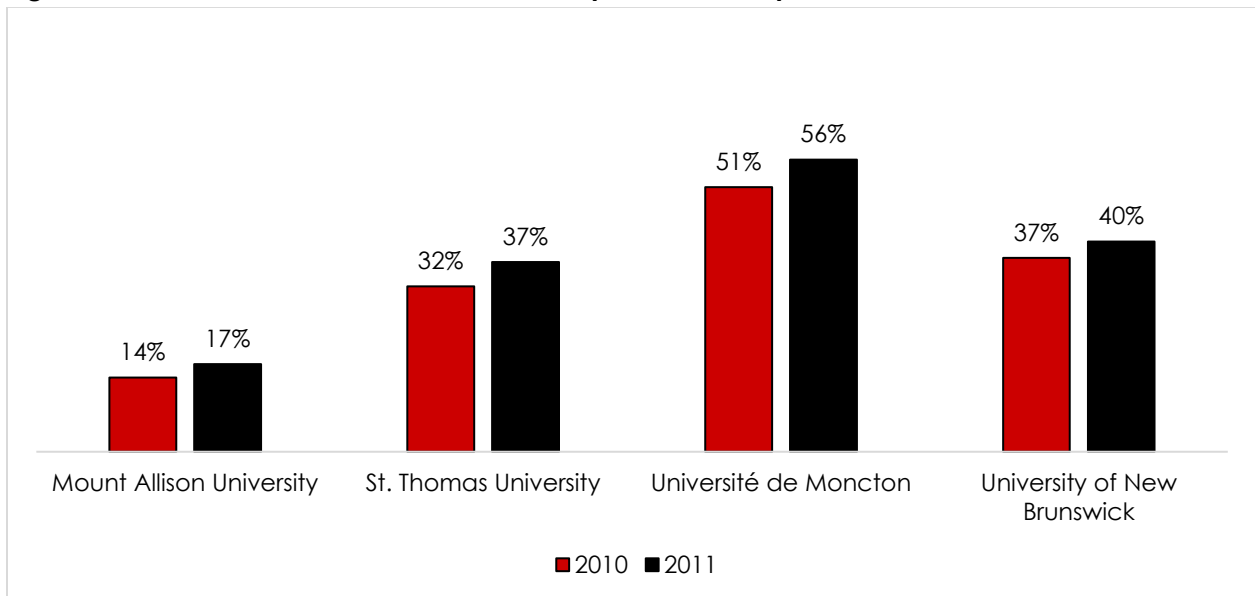
Figure 39: 5-Year Retention Rates of Graduates by Educational Institution
