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GENERAL INFORMATION

Introduction:

Welcome to the University of New Brunswick! As a Postdoctoral Fellow (PDF/Postdocs), we recognize that you provide an essential service to our faculties and departments. You are pivotal to the advancement of research at UNB. The University of New Brunswick (UNB) offers many services, resources and facilities to assist you in your goals during your time spent with us.

Postdocs come to UNB from all over the world and at various times of the year. Since there is so much diversification, Postdocs are classified as neither students nor employees. Coming to a new university is always an adjustment, and in recognition of that we have created this guide to assist new Postdocs with their transition. It is designed to give an overview of the institution and the surrounding areas and will hopefully assist you in assessing the general life at both the Saint John and Fredericton campuses. There is also a wealth of information for our International Postdocs.

Terms and Duration

Postdocs are invited to UNB for various timeframes, some for as little as one month, others for a three year period (which is the maximum time a person can be a Postdoc at this University).

Exceptions in Eligibility

The Office of the Vice President (Research) holds the responsibility for PDFs at this institution and has various policies related to their existence. One such policy states that a person must be within 3 years receipt of their PhD in order to be eligible for a Fellowship position at UNB. Exceptions have been made in the past when a candidate has recently experienced a disruption in their work due to parental responsibilities, undertaking additional degree work, military service, or other special circumstances. Exceptions have also been made in the case of narrowly defined research or candidates who are substantially changing their field of research.

Letter of Offer

When you are reading your letter of offer, be sure to check that the following information is included and correct:

- Your name and contact information;
- The start and end date of your fellowship which is determined by your department;
- An understanding on authorship and intellectual property rights and any other special conditions that may apply;
- Benefit information;
- The fellowship/stipend amount
- Job responsibilities

Benefits

Since this fellowship does not constitute employment income, it is not subject to deductions by UNB for Canada Pension Plan (CPP), Employment Insurance (EI), or other UNB faculty benefit plans including health coverage. Please be advised that Postdocs are not covered by such benefit plans and that you are responsible to make arrangements to ensure you do have basic medical coverage during your tenure at UNB. If you are not a Canadian citizen, you may be eligible for such coverage under Canada's universal health care system (Medicare). If you do not currently have coverage and you are interested in applying for Medicare you may do so via their website at <http://www.gnb.ca/0394/eligibility-e.asp>. If you are interested in receiving information regarding the extended medical and dental plan available to you please contact the GSA Health and Dental Benefits Coordinator, within the first 3 weeks of your work term.

Curriculum Vitae (CV)

It is extremely important that your CV is up to date, and includes proof of a doctoral degree or a successful PhD defence. In order to be a PDF, you must have completed your doctorate degree.

Processing

A Letter of Offer will be sent to all Postdocs by the Office of the Vice President (Research). This letter will clearly outline:

- the term and locations of appointment
- financial terms
- specific benefits offered to the Postdocs (if any exist)
- information on the Postdoc's rights and responsibilities

Postdocs should familiarize themselves with the Policy in its entirety and how it applies to her/his appointment.

Acceptance of the appointment must be received in writing to the Office of the Vice-President (Research) by the Postdoc one-month prior to the commencement of the term. As well, before taking up the appointment, the Postdoc must ensure that all pertinent appointment documentation including proof of doctoral degree or successful PhD defence, appointment offer and acceptance; c.v.; Social Insurance Number (SIN), and Employment Authorization (issued by the department of Citizenship & Immigration in the case the Postdoc is not a Canadian citizen or

Landed Immigrant) is submitted to the Human Resources and Organizational Development Office.

Postdoctoral Coordinator

The Postdoctoral Coordinator offers assistance with the administration of all things related to Postdoctoral Fellows. Please note the UNB Policy has enforced that we cannot assist in obtaining legal documentation such as work permits. If you have any concerns or questions that cannot be addressed within your faculty/department please feel free to contact the coordinator, who will assist you to the best of their ability.

Policy on Misconduct in Research

This policy is currently being drafted and will be available soon.

Intellectual Property Rights

As a Postdoc you are to receive credit and recognition for the publication of your research and appropriate recognition for the transfer and commercialization of research discoveries. Unless otherwise agreed in writing by you and the University, you will retain ownership of all intellectual property rights in your work (solely when you have created it individually; and jointly when it has been created by your effort and that of one or more members of the University). For example, certain specific cases such as, when you are working under a research contract. The University shall have a non-exclusive, royalty-free right to the internal use of all such intellectual property.

Frequently Asked Questions

I would like to be a Postdoctoral Fellow at UNB. How do I apply?

Postdoctoral Fellows (PDFs) are hired individually by UNB Researchers. The Office of the VP Research is responsible issuing all formal offers to potential PDFs upon review of all the paperwork required from the Researcher(s) in order to offer a PDF but we do not seek out or interview prospective applicants. Our advice is always to contact the department(s) that best suit your interests or abilities and ask them to circulate your CV within their units as a potential Postdoctoral Fellow.

I have received funding to conduct a Postdoctoral Fellowship at any institution of my choosing and I would like to come to UNB. What do I need to do?

If you are coming to UNB as a PDF and your funding will be coming to you directly from a third party you are still required to seek out a UNB faculty member/Researcher to supervise you during your time at UNB. This person will need to complete the necessary paperwork identifying you as a UNB PDF which will ensure that you are added to any risk management or liability policies present at UNB. If you are having difficulty identifying someone we can certainly help you make some connections.

As a UNB Postdoctoral Fellow will I have to pay taxes?

Yes, since the release of the Federal Budget in 2010 which clarified the fact that fellowships are taxable income in Canada all PDFs at UNB are responsible to pay Income Tax. PDFs at UNB however, are not responsible to pay CPP (Canada Pension Plan) or EI (Employment Insurance) premiums.

My Visa application is asking for a Labour Market Opinion file number, how do I get this?

Postdoctoral Fellowships are Human Resources and Development Canada (HRDC) exempt and do not require HRDC approval to conduct research/teaching activities in Canada. This exemption falls under regulation #205(c) ii, code C44. The engagement letter templates have been written with careful attention to non-residents and include the required information for the CIC application.

Can I be a Postdoctoral Fellow at UNB if I have not yet graduated with my PhD?

If a person has completed all of the requirements for his/her PhD (all courses, thesis, defence, and final submission of thesis copies to the university) and is merely waiting to convocate, he/she may begin a fellowship. The Postdoctoral Coordinator will request you provide a letter from the Graduate Studies Office at your current university verifying this information. Please note that there is a 3 year grace period to begin your term at UNB from the date of receiving the PhD and if a person has not yet defended his/her thesis, they are not eligible to be a Postdoc.

What does the Vice-President (Research) office need in order to process a new Postdoctoral Fellowship application?

In order to process a new Postdoc application this office requires that the supervisor submit:

- an “Application to Hire a New Postdoctoral Fellow”
- a current version of the potential Postdocs Curriculum Vitae
- two letters of reference
- if the PDF will be paid directly from any outside source, a copy of their award letter must be included
- proof of receiving or defending PhD

How and when do I get paid?

Postdocs will be paid bi-weekly. It is imperative that we have received acceptance of your offer and that you have reported to the Human Resources & Organizational Development Department to sign all necessary payroll documentation before your payroll can commence. For that visit you should arrive with identification, your work permit (if applicable), your Social Insurance Number, and proof of a Canadian bank account number. For payroll documentation please visit: <http://www.unb.ca/hr/>. If you are late arriving (if it is past the original start date indicated on your letter of offer) your supervisor will need to complete further paperwork with the Office of the VP (Research) before you can be added to the payroll system.

How do I obtain access to the UNB Libraries?

Once in the payroll or Human Resources system, you are then able to acquire your UNB Identification Card (UCard). This will, among other things, give you access to all UNB libraries.

The office administration staff in your department will need to set up a guest account for you in order to have this resource if you are funded directly by a third party source.

UNB-UCard



The UCard is the University of New Brunswick's official Photo ID Card. Much more than a simple ID, this card gives you discounts around town, access to library resources, entry to URec facilities, meal plans, entrance to exams, secure areas and can even be used as a campus debit card.

Information for International Postdoctoral Fellowships

Work Visa and Work Permit

If you are a prospective Postdoc who is neither a Canadian citizen nor permanent resident, you must apply for a Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC) work permit in your current country of residence (provided you have a valid residence permit in that country) PRIOR to leaving for your fellowship.

You can apply for a work permit as you enter Canada, but only if you are temporary resident visa exempt. For a list of these countries please visit:

To apply for a work permit

- Obtain a passport that is valid for the time period you anticipate being in Canada.
- Secure a Letter of Offer from the Office of the Vice President (Research) that will include the term of the appointment, the annum salary and source of funding. There is paperwork your intended supervisor must complete and send to the VP Research Office to have this letter generated. Please note: The document checklist for a work permit requests that you provide your offer letter and the file number provided by Human Resources and Skills Development Canada (HRSDC) to locate the Labour market opinion. You do not need this file number. Postdocs are Human Resources and Skills Development Canada (HRSDC) exempt and do not require HRSDC approval to conduct research/teaching activities in Canada. This exemption falls under regulation #205(c) ii, code C44. The engagement letter templates have been written with careful attention to non-residents and include the required information for the CIC application.
- Complete the Citizenship and Immigration Canada work permit application. (<http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/information/applications/work.asp>)
- Submit your application to the Canadian Visa office responsible for your area. Consult the relevant office regarding accepted methods of submitting applications (i.e. general mail, in person, by courier etc.). Review the final application closely prior to submission to ensure all required documents are included.
- You will be required to pay a non-refundable application processing fee of \$150 Canadian (or the equivalent in your local currency).
- In some cases you will require a medical examination. If so, you will be informed by an immigration officer who will send you instructions on how to proceed. A medical examination may add over three months to the processing of your application.
- Your application is processed at the Canadian immigration office outside of Canada. This information is then electronically transferred to port of entries in Canada. Once your application has been processed you will receive a LETTER OF APPROVAL and a WORK VISA stamped on your passport, with which you can then travel to Canada.
- You must show this letter to the Customs officer when you arrive in Canada. The Customs officer at the port of entry (in Canada) will find your name on the electronic

system, enter additional data, then print and **issue the WORK PERMIT** document, normally for the expected length of your appointment.

- **Please do not leave the immigration control area of the airport without getting your work permit and reading it carefully.** Be sure there are no errors in the spelling of your name, your birthday, your country of birth, or country of citizenship. Read and understand the conditions listed on your Work Permit and check to ensure the expiry date is correct. **Do not be afraid to ask the officer questions and to point out any errors.**

Social Insurance Number (SIN):

All Postdocs must have a Social Insurance Number (SIN) before they can be paid. This can be obtained by visiting the nearest Service Canada office once you arrive in New Brunswick:

Employment for International Postdoctoral Fellowship Spouses/Partners

Before a Postdocs spouse can work they must first obtain employment authorization, which can be done once they and their spouse have arrived in Canada. More information and forms can be obtained from Citizenship & Immigration Canada (<http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/visit/index.asp>). Note that a non-refundable processing fee of \$150 is required for employment authorization.

International Postdoctoral Fellows with School-Aged Children

When entering into the country with an adult holding a valid work permit, school-aged or dependent children normally do not need a permit to study in Canada. Indicate on the work permit application that dependent children will be entering Canada with the applicant. In addition, parents or guardians must be able to provide the child's birth certificate, citizenship card, health records, and passport.

The responsibility is up to the Postdoc to carefully review the application procedures and permit limitations prior to submitting his/her application to Citizenship and Immigration Canada. Some children will be required to submit a study permit application independently of his/her parent's/guardian's work permit.

It is best to consult with a Citizen and Immigration Canada representative at a Canadian embassy, high commission, or consulate to ensure that any child that will be entering Canada receives a proper permit or is indicated as a dependent on the Postdoc's permit.

Work Permit Extensions:

In most circumstances work permits can be extended as necessary for the duration of the job offer. Postdocs who already hold a valid CIC work permit and who wish to extend their stay in Canada should submit a CIC 'application to change conditions, extend my stay or remain in Canada form' (<http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/information/applications/extendworker.asp>) at least 30 days before the expiry date. An appointment renewal letter from the Office of the Vice President (Research) will be required. The renewal letter should include the term of the reappointment, the annum salary, source of funding support and the HRDC exemption clause. You do not need the file number by HRSDC.

There can be a delay in having your permit extended; however, you have "implied status" if you can demonstrate that you applied for an extension prior to the expiry date of the work permit. To show that you applied before the expiry date either pay the required fees online and retain the receipt and/or ask for a courier or mail receipt when you send your applications to the nearest case processing centre. If your work permit expires you will not be paid. Provide both the Human Resources and Organizational Development Office and the VP (Research) with copies of your payment and mail receipts to ensure continued payment.

Please note: For international Postdocs whose country of citizenship requires a Temporary Residence Visa (TRV) to enter Canada, you need to remember to also extend your TRV when you extend your work permit. It is your responsibility to ensure your TRV remains valid if you wish to re-enter Canada after leaving, for example if you wish to attend a conference outside of Canada or go home for a visit. Your work permit does not guarantee re-entry into Canada. After leaving, you must apply for and obtain a TRV by applying to a Canadian Visa office outside of Canada.

New Brunswick Climate:

New Brunswick has four seasons, fall, winter, spring, and summer. With each new season brings opportunities for unique outdoor activities in Fredericton and Saint John. Fall is spectacular because of the province's abundance of parks and forests. The season rivals better known areas of New England for its vibrant shades of red, yellow and orange.

Fall

This is a beautiful season but you need to make sure you are warm enough to enjoy the scenery. Temperatures may range from 17.7 to -9.7 C (64 - 15). It is a rainy season so make sure to have a raincoat or an umbrella. Bring a warm jacket, gloves and a hat for November and December.

Winter

Temperatures are dangerous, unless you are dressed properly. We see plenty of snow (245 cm December-March) and cold temperatures (lows of -7C to -30C December-March). Cross-country skiing on the New Brunswick trail system is popular at this time of year. Temperatures below zero degrees Celsius can freeze your ears, nose, fingers or toes before you realize it. Waiting for a bus, or walking a short distance home, can result in frostbite or freezing. To survive a Canadian winter, you should wear the following clothing outside:

- A warm fleece/wool hat that covers your head and ears.
- Fleece/wool mittens or thick warm gloves on your hands.
- A warm fleece/wool scarf around your neck that can be pulled up over your face if needed.
- Long underwear under your jeans, on lined nylon pants over top of them.
- Warm wool socks and lined winter boots.
- A warm winter coat. Preferably wind resistant.
- Warm "emergency" clothing in your car, in case it breaks down.

Spring

In the spring the temperature ranges from 8.4 to 19.5 C (47-67 F) which is normally still quite cool, but many people still head outdoors to watch for the first signs of buds opening. What to wear during spring is a warm jacket and clothing that can be layered.

Summer

New Brunswick is comfortably warm (highs of 19C to 26C June-September) with occasional periods of hotter temperatures. Once again, the city's inland location keeps it warmer than areas that are closer to the ocean breezes. Summer rainfall in this area normally averages 363 mm (June-September).
