

### **Synopsis**

This video explores the concept of oral corrective feedback and the role it plays in language proficiency development.

According to Lyster (2016, p.37), "Corrective feedback is a response from the teacher to statements made by learners that contain an error". There are various types of corrective feedback, employing both explicit and implicit correction, that teachers can use to support their language learners. Corrective feedback can also be used in content-based language classes, especially when errors impede communication or meaning.

This video also underscores the importance of creating a climate where learners feel comfortable taking risks. Errors are part of the language learning journey and corrective feedback supports learners in that process. Techniques that encourage learners to notice the error for themselves and self-correct have been found to be most effective.
